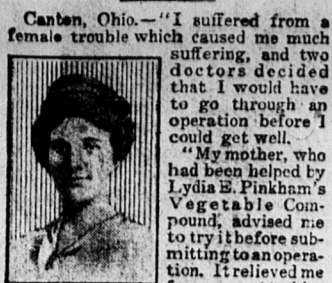

ATTACK ON OFFICER RESENTED

LONDON, April 4.—Lt. Col. Pratt's accusations in the Ontario Legislature have evoked expressions of deepest resentment at military headquarters here. The feeling is that these particularly mean attacks on defenceless officers are the outcome of personal spite or disgruntled failure of one whose own military career can in no way be considered successful.

A very high authority declared: "It is felt that if these unfair attacks are to continue by officers particularly who have seen no service in the line and whose files contain adverse reports upon their conduct whilst in France these adverse reports will require to be made public."

Regarding the charges of bribery from airmen this statement is absolutely denied. It pointed out the charges must be untrue because the Canadian headquarters exercises no control over the repatriation of Canadians in the Royal Air Force. This is the sole responsibility of the Air Ministry. The statement regarding women and children having to stand in the streets of London all night is also untrue.

LUXURY PROVIDED IN AIR FLYING

The possibilities of luxury and comfort in future passenger flights by airplane have been illustrated in a striking manner recently in London. In one of the largest department stores a Handley-Page passenger airplane has been on exhibition, of the regular two-engine type, as successfully used prior to the armistice as a night bomber over the German lines. The fuselage, or body, including the fore and rear cabins, originally used by the gunners, merchants and observer, and the centre section, where the bombs were carried, was readily converted into a pleasant passenger saloon.

The compartment extends the full width and about one-third the length of the fuselage, and is 6 feet 6 inches

from floor to ceiling. Armchairs were provided for seventeen passengers. They were placed along both sides of the fuselage, all facing forward, with an unobstructed view through the windows, which extend along the sides. Entrance to the saloon was from below through two trapdoors in the floor, giving access to the gangway between the seats. An additional seat for an outside passenger was provided in a cockpit—formerly occupied by the forward machine gunner—in front of the pilot. The main compartment was fitted with electric lamps of the candle pattern and gilded mirrors. The machine, though only half the size of the giant Handley-Page, is 32 feet 6 inches long, the span from tip to tip of the wings is 100 feet, the height 23 feet, and the fully loaded weight will be 6½ tons. The "aerobus," as it has been called, will be driven by two Rolls-Royce engines of 350 horse power each, and the speed

obtainable is estimated at nearly 100 miles an hour.
