Robinson As "Clitterhouse" At The Capitol

Edward G. Robinson comes to the screen of the Capitol Theatre today in what he has described as the most fascinating role of his career—the truly extraordinary title character of "The Amazing Dr. Clitterhouse," a bizarre crime film with hilarious undertones of comedy.

It is the tale of a distinguished neurologist who embarks upon a career of crime in order, so he says, to study the mental and physical reactions of criminals during those moments when they are perpetrating their crimes.

He becomes as successful a criminal in the course of his allegedly scientific dual existence as he is a surgeon. In fact, his facile brain soon enables him to become the leader of a bit-time band of robbers previously dominated by Humphrey Bogart and Claire Trevor. He is the stylishly garbed "fence."

Leading his band in one big robbery after another, the doctor seems to manifest a strange zest for his illegal enterprises until he is suddenly brought up short by arrest for the murder of Bogart. Since on trial for his life, the doctor escapes the penalty for the murder he has undoubtedly committed by a shrewd manipulation of the psychology of the jurors. It is one of the strangest denouements ever related in any film, but convincing nevertheless and highly amusing.

THE TWO BONETTES

DEATH-DEFYING DARE DEVILS OF THE AIR

One of the big attractions at the Provincial Exhibition, Charlottetown, will be **BONETTE BROTHERS BIG BALLOON**. This monster air-bag measures 75 feet by 45 feet and will be flown by Professor C. C. Bonette, oldest experienced balloonist in America, who has more than 4,000 times played tag with death and is still hale and hearty. Professor Bonette is King of Aeronauts and he and his balloon have been seen by millions of Americans. This will be his first visit to the Maritimes and he will be accompanied by his son, Bonette Jr., who claims to be the world's greatest balloon jumper.

The balloon will be inflated at the east end of the centre-field every morning and on or about two o'clock p.m. in the afternoon the ascension will take place, and when it is about one thousand feet or more in the air, Bonette Jr. will drop from the balloon hanging to a parachute by his teeth and doing one of four different stunts. Each afternoon will witness a change of stunt. In the evening Bonette Jr. will include his famous sky ride on a 500 foot steel cable from a sixty foot height, sliding by his teeth through blazing set pieces of fireworks concluding with Niagara Falls spectacle.

Various precautions have to be taken in connection with the brilliant ascension. A motor boat will be stationed on the river to pick up balloon, and trees will be on the roads in readiness to salvage balloon and occupant wherever they land.

The Bonette Brothers' balloon and sky ride act have been brought to this Province at great expense.
