Naval Campaign by Navy League

WILL TAKE STEPS TO AWAKEN PEOPLE TO REALIZATION OF DUTY

CALGARY, June 1.—(C. P.)—Saint John, N. B., was chosen as the meeting place for next year's annual meeting of the Dominion Council, Navy League of Canada, at its session here Tuesday. The meeting will be held in June, 1923. Because the speech from the Throne noted the expansion of Canada's seaborne commerce, but did not formulate any proposal by which Canada could take an her share of the protection of her own trade, and because for that commerce protection is necessary the council resolved to "take steps to awaken the people to a realization of their duty by a vigorous educational campaign". Captain H. Pybus, R.N.R., of Vancouver, was elected vice-president, succeeding Eric Hamber, and J. P. Gregory, of Saint John, N. B., was elected a member of the Dominion Council, succeeding R.E. Armstrong. Other officers were re-elected. Mr. J. O. Hyndman, Charlottetown, who was unable to be present was re-elected to the Council.

Veal calves were noted from \$7.00 to \$8.50, according to quality, and hogs \$10.40 on a flat basis, and on a graded basis \$10.25 for thick smooths, \$1.00 per hog premium on select, 50 cents per hog on cut on shops, and \$1.00 per hog cut on heavies.

The Fathers of Confederation

THE HON. ALEXANDER CAMPBELL

This gentleman was one of the seven elected members who represented the interest of Upper Canada (now Ontario) at the various meetings that led up to Confederation in 1867. It is rather unfortunate that at this day and distance we know very little of the actual part played by various delegates to the conferences that led to Confederation. The conference meetings were secret, or supposed to be at least. We can ascertain the activities of each individual delegate in the open meetings, and it is in such that the gentleman whose name appears at the head of this short sketch, shines forth in one of the great moments of his life. The exact date was the 17th of February, 1865. Those interested in the proposed Confederation in the union house of Upper and Lower Canada had spent a weary day on that particular date. The opposition members had rallied this talent and were directing a fusillade of anti-confederation arguments. At times their attitude even became abusive.

Toward the late afternoon the Hon. Alexander Campbell rose to his feet and made the greatest speech of his life. Point by point he answered the pertinent questions that had been hurled during the day. The dark and gloomy future of Canada as it had been painted by the opposition, was illuminated with sunshine and prosperity. He had never been regarded as an orator, although he had been a member of the legislature from 1858, but on this one occasion he made his name. When he wiped the perspiration from his brow and resumed his seat he was cheered to the rafters. He had won a great battle. Single handed he had defeated the combined forces of the anti-confederates.

This remarkable man, who shines for such a short time in the story of Confederation, was a Yorkshireman by birth. He was brought to Canada by his parents when he was but two years of age. His parents moved about the eastern portion of Upper Canada for some time before choosing Kingston as their home. The young man received his education from various sources and then studied law. For a while he was a Junior in the law office of Henry Cassidy, Kingston. That gentleman died in 1839 and Mr. Campbell then entered the legal establishment of John A. Macdonald. Four years later this firm took on a new name: "Macdonald & Campbell."

In 1851 he entered public life as an alderman on the Kingston City Council. He was a member of the Quebec Union Conference in 1864. He does not appear to have taken any other public steps in the Confederation movement. He was the
