THE RAILWAY COMMISSION.

Since our last issue the death of Judge Killam, the Chairman of the Railway Commission, has reduced the membership of that important Board to two. Is the announced intention of the Government to add three members after the close of the present session, which taken in connection with the latest vacancy means the appointment of four new members.

The Railway Commission is, as we have before pointed out, a most important Board, having jurisdiction over all the company railways in Canada, and having recently had added thereto the control of express and telephone rates. What the Supreme Court is in legal matters the Railway Board is in regard to transportation matters throughout Canada. It has already rendered most important service, and most arduous and important duties await it in the future.

We regard it as of prime importance that our Province shall be represented on the newly constructed railway Board. To no one Province of Canada is the readjustment of railway rates, especially through rates, and express rates, so vital and important to the very life of our trade and industry as are these matters to Prince Edward Island. That is why The Guardian is urging with all its force the appointment of an Island man.

We have plenty of good men, for that matter plenty of good men belonging to the party in power, if the choice is to be thus limited, men who would command the confidence and respect of the Province and of the Dominion and who could and would render invaluable service. In this connection we may say that among the number are Captain Joseph Read already favorably mentioned in these columns and Horace Hazard ex-M. P. both of whom have strong claims upon the Liberal party as well as exceptional qualifications for the position.

It is not The Guardian's object merely to obtain preferment for any man. That must be a merely secondary consideration to obtaining recognition, representation, and useful service for the Province at large. If that is to be obtained active and energetic action must be taken and promptly taken before the new appointments are made. The press, the Boards of Trade and all the agencies by which Governmental action can be influenced and public opinion concentrated should be set in motion.

A strong united effort ought to be made, and we are confident that if resolutely made it will succeed. We are nearing a general election and that is a point in our favor. We have too long slept upon our rights and failed to assert ourselves as we ought. Once convinced that Prince Edward Island is awake and determined to have some voice in matters pertaining to transportation the Government must give heed to our earnestness and the justice of our cause.

Commission after Commission has been appointed having powers in some cases only less than those of Parliament itself and our Province has not even claimed to be represented thereon. In the meantime one third of our representation in the House of Commons has been taken away, and we have been deprived of all representation in the Dominion Cabinet where we formerly were represented in an important portfolio.

Surely it is time for our Province to assert itself before the last door of opportunity is closed in our faces. There is an opening now, and a most important one. Our claim to representation on the Railway Board cannot be grainsaid. In almost everything else our Province has been passed over and treated as of little or no account. Let us insist upon our present right, and we believe it will be conceded. But should it be denied us we shall then be able to size up

the situation and govern ourselves, accordingly. What say our press contemporaries? Our Boards of Trade?

MINISTERS IN POLITICS.

A few days ago a monster delegation of the Ontario Temperance Alliance waited upon Premier Whitney to urge further legislation to restrict the liquor traffic. Among the spokesmen of the delegation were ministers of the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist bodies, the latter being represented by Rev. Dr. Carman, the venerable Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada who spoke with no uncertain sound upon the great question at issue. Incidentally he referred to the propriety of clergymen like himself taking part in politics. He emphatically declared that he is in politics and is there to stay.

Among other things Dr. Carman is reported as saying: "There are some ministers who lift up their hands in holy horror at the mere mention of politics. I want to declare it before this assembly, before the intelligence and the conscience of this country, that as a Canadian and a Briton, before God and the people, I am in politics. I'm in politics on this moral question, and I am continually in politics, in prayer and in sermons I am in politics, and in advice to the people in reference to these great moral questions I am in politics."

With great issues pertaining to the public health and moral welfare of the country being constantly legislated upon, questions affecting sobriety, the sanctity of oaths, the bribery curse, the right of the voter to the free and untrammelled bestowal of his vote, the protection of the day of rest, and other vital issues, the minister who stands apart from politics as one that has no interest, or who fears he may give offence to the laic moral course of the patriotic spirit which rightly belongs to his high calling, Dr. Carman, at least is not of that stripe. And there are others.

THE AUTOMOBILE QUESTION.

In view of the interest taken in the use of automobiles on the public streets and highways, a public meeting has been called under the auspices of the Board of Trade, to be held at the Board rooms this evening for the discussion of the question. We learn that the meeting will be attended by a number of members of the Legislature and the City Council with a view to learn what measures in the way of provincial or civic legislation the general public desires to be taken in the premises. All citizens interested in this matter should attend in order that their views and wishes may be made known as far as practicable and that the Legislature may be properly informed and advised.

Under existing conditions there has been loss, inconvenience and danger to limb and life which seem out of proportion to the benefits accruing, or likely to come from the use of the new vehicles, although their owners have been so far reasonably careful. Edward rides in a motor car. But in many ways our case in this Province is exceptional. Our narrow country roads, the long, dark, narrow Hillsboro bridge, the number of auto cars likely always to be few, so that the majority of horses will never become used to them; are among the factors which make the case exceptionally difficult to deal with. Some regulations must be laid down, and what these should be can be best decided after a fair and full hearing of the parties interested on both sides.

THE DEADLOCK AT OTTAWA.

A day and night sitting in the Commons closed last week's business in Parliament the result of what will be called obstructive tactics on the part of the Opposition. That is, however, a very narrow view of the case. It is a basic principle of free parliamentary Government not only that not a dollar shall be expended that has not been first voted by the people's representatives, but that every dollar so voted and expended shall be accounted for at the next session of Parliament.

In this as in too many previous cases the Government were withholding information properly applied for and promised. Former Governments had done the same thing, but that affords no proper pretext for repeating the offence which was strongly condemned by the Liberals when in Opposition. Mr. Brodeur was a very extravagant Speaker, and is now an extravagant Minister. The Opposition are rendering real service to the country in insisting by all the means in their power for a full accounting of all unduly lavish or doubtful expenditure. And the withholding of information properly due to the House is always bad politics.
