**Meeting of Presbytery.**

At Charlottetown and within the Zion Church there, on Tuesday, August 7th at 11 a. m., which place and time the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted Rev. D. B. McLeod, Moderator, with whom were present Messrs. Sinclair, Sutherland, Adam Gunn, Arch'd Gunn, Stewart, Spencer Rod'k, McLean, Fisher, Millar, Herdman, Whidden, Craise, Gratz, W. H. Smith, E. Smith, McIntosh, McNeill, and Layton Ministers and D. McLaren and D. A. Bruce ruling elders.

The minutes of meetings May 8th, 29th, 31st and June the 17th were read and sustained. Rev. W. H. Spencer was appointed Moderator for the next six months. Mr. T. C. James, clerk for the year, Rev. Mr. Leitch, St. Elmo, Ont., Mr. McIntosh of Grand Bay, N. B., and Geo. McMillan of Kentville, N. S., were invited to correspond.

After reading communications the Presbytery took up the matter of church property, which on motion was referred to the committee appointed by Synod. The Clerk reported in reference to the call from Dundas to Rev. Mr. Buchanan. The call was set aside, the Presbytery expressing sympathy with the congregation. A bill from Rev. Mr. Fraser against the Dundas congregation was presented, and it was agreed in this special case to ask the Home Mission Committee to pay pro rata per Sabbath, the congregation being required to make up the balance of seventeen dollars.

The minute presented by Rev. Dr. Murray on the occasion of his jubilee, having been read, was on motion accepted as the minute of Presbytery, and ordered to be engrossed in the minutes. The following committee was appointed to examine the Session records of Bloomfield congregation: Rev. A. J. McNeill and Mr. D. A. Bruce.

The Moderator on motion appointed the following committee to strike standing committees: Revs. Adam Gunn, W. H. Smith, W. H. Spencer and Mr. D. McLaren, Elders.  
The Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the same place at half past two p. m., of which public intimation was made, and this sederunt closed with the benediction.
