Candidates whose names are published herein who do not wish to qualify for teachers' licences will be admitted at the opening of the College term (a) either to the Commercial Department where they will study the subjects of Shorthand, Typewriting, etc., in lieu of the work in Teacher Training, or (b) to the Academic Course leading to a more general or professional education. In order that arrangements may be made at the Prince of Wales College students purposing to attend College must notify the Principal not later than August 25th, of the particular course of studies which their parents wish them to pursue, as students will not be allowed to change their course after classwork has begun. Prince of Wales College and Normal School will begin its session for 1928-29 on Tuesday, September 4th, at 1 p. m., when registration of students will take place, and fees be received. All students coming to this institution for the first time will then present themselves together with those students who wish to be examined for admission to the second year. Former students entering Second Year will be registered on Thursday at 1 o'clock, those entering Third Year will be registered on Monday, September 10th at 1 p. m. Schools with mid-summer and fall vacation will open on Tuesday, August 14th. All other schools except those of Charlottetown and Summerside will open two weeks later.
