SSIDE BOARD TO ASK FOR 3 TEACHERS

Third Additional Teacher Believed To Be Necessary For Grades 11 And 12.

The Summerside School Board met last night to discuss the reply received by the chairman, Dr. E. T. Tanton, in pursuance of the recent conference between the School Board and Hon. Dr. MacMillan, Minister of Education, in regard to having Grade 11 and Grade 12 added to the High School. Dr. MacMillan in his reply stated that the Board of Education would be willing to provide a teacher for grade 11 this year and if necessary one for grade 12 next year.

The Board was of the opinion that two teachers would not be sufficient for the two extra grades. The chairman, Dr. Tanton, explained that in order that the student could successfully write the exams set according to the Maritime standard, the course of studies would be along the lines followed by the Nova Scotian high school and he felt they would need assurance from the Government that if it was found a third teacher was necessary, the Government would pay the salary. Dr. Tanton said that the studies would be different in some respects from Prince of Wales and would include economics and modern languages.

Mr. McLeod felt that three teachers would be necessary another year and that the chairman should write to the Minister of Education to ascertain if they would grant another teacher.

Dr. McPhee was of the opinion that for this year one teacher would be sufficient. For Grade 12, two teachers would not doubt be required, perhaps not next year but as time went on.

The Board was unanimously of the opinion that before asking the Town Council to provide the money for the building required for these extra grades, it would be necessary to have assurance from the Government that the salaries of three teachers would be guaranteed by them. In the brief presented to the Premier an additional staff of not less than three nor more than five qualified instructors was asked for.

It was moved by Mr. Neil McLeod, K. C., seconded by Mr. Mark Gaudet, that the chairman write to the Minister of Education and ascertain if they will be granted a third teacher if required. After receiving a reply, the Board would meet to discuss the plans of building a new wing. The size of building would depend a good deal on whether they could have the necessary teachers. Meeting adjourned.

FRANCHISE FOR WOMEN URGED IN QUEBEC

Mrs. D. J. Riley, Charlottetown Is Vice President of National Liberal Women's Organization.

OTTAWA, May 5.—(By the Canadian Press)—Representatives of Quebec in the Senate and House of Commons were urged to exert every effort to obtain votes for women in provincial and municipal elections in that Province in a resolution passed at the National Federation of Liberal Women Convention held here today.

Presenting the resolution, Hon. Cairine Wilson, Canada's only woman Senator, declared women are deeply interested in all social questions and their votes would be useful in bringing about needed reforms in legislation dealing with problems of maternal and child welfare.

Delegates to the convention from all parts of the Dominion attended the convention business sessions and luncheon addresses by Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice.

Mrs. W. C. Kennedy, of Windsor, Ont., was chosen president, succeeding Hon. Mary Ellen Smith, of Vancouver, and reports on organization were presented by leaders in provincial Liberal women's organizations. Members of the Federation's various committees tabled reports showing steady growth of the Federation's influence.

U. S. Import Taxes Will Affect Canada

WASHINGTON, May 5.—(By Ken Clark, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)—Desperately attempting to get the necessary funds to balance the United States Budget, the Senate finance committee today yielded to the demands of special interests for import taxes on lumber, copper, coal, oil and gasoline. A Canadian export trade worth many million dollars a year is definitely threatened.

The committee voted the following duties:
Lumber—Increased from one dollar to three dollars per board feet.
Copper—Four cents a pound.
Coal—Two dollars a ton.
Oil—One-half cent a gallon.
Gasoline—Two and one-half cents a gallon.

The proposed tariffs on lumber, copper and coal were prohibitive. They would eliminate an export trade roughly estimated for 1931 as follows: Lumber \$15,000,000; copper \$13,500,000; coal \$700,000. Their effect would be felt from coast to coast in Canada. Copper comes from British Columbia, Ontario and Quebec; coal from the Prairie Provinces, and lumber from British Columbia and the Maritime Provinces.

Forces opposed to the introduction of tariff provisions in a tax bill were hopeful tonight the duties would be eliminated when the bill reached the floor of the Senate, but the situation was rendered uncertain by their re-introduction after they had once been cut out. The fight in the chamber will be close. The attitude of a number of Senators is summed up in Senator William E. O. Borah's remark when he introduced the bill: "I have doubted the wisdom of legislating on tariff questions in a tax bill but I can see no possible reason for including copper and coal when such consideration does not apply to lumber—we will have to see to that."
