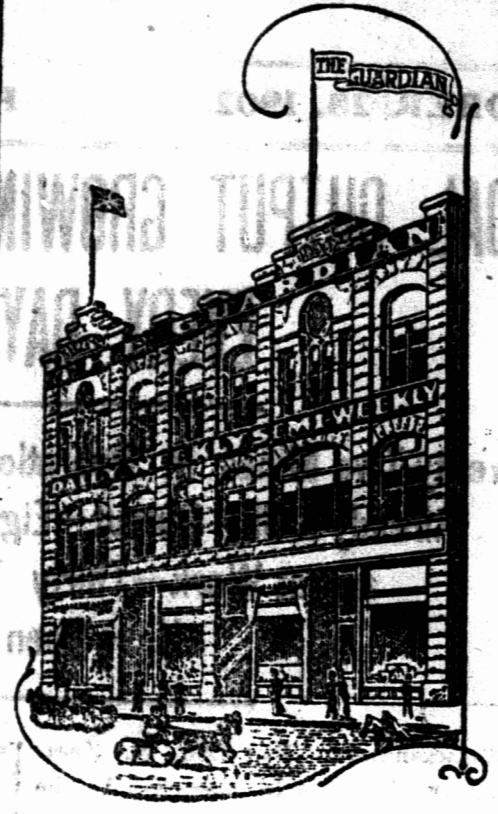


**Where Eye Troubles Begin**

**REV. J. H. HECTOR.**

The visit of Rev. J. H. Hector to our midst, and the addresses he is delivering form a topic of general interest in the community. Wherever he has been once heard the people throng to hear him in ever increasing numbers. The fact that our largest halls and churches have proved insufficient to hold the crowds which desire admittance is one of the highest compliments that could be paid to any speaker or lecturer. And there is good reason to hope that among the large numbers who listen to his preaching and temperance addresses many may be benefited, while the cause of righteousness and temperance is promoted.

The Black Knight's addresses are characterized by great earnestness, by the fervor peculiar to his race, by touches of humor which appeal to the masses, and by an aptness and force of illustration which make one forget that the speaker is not an educated nor perhaps always a logical speaker. He affords in his own person an admirable illustration of the text of his address in the Opera House: Make good use of what you have. Born in bondage and denied the advantages of early education, under some prejudice because of color even in our free and cosmopolitan country, he has attained a store of information, a knowledge of human nature and a power to sway men which may be envied by the most highly endowed and cultured men of the white race. That he has consecrated his gifts to noble uses is a matter for congratulation both to him self and to those who are privileged to hear him.

But it is not with the object of praising Rev. Mr. Hector that this article is written. It is rather that the lessons he has so forcibly inculcated shall be applied practically for the betterment and blessing of the individual and the community. It ought not to be all in vain that the minds of this Christian community have been stirred up in regard to the temperance question. But it will be all in vain if renewed efforts are not put forth to move the authorities to action, to close up the dens of iniquity which abound on every hand and to make renewed and continued effort to "burst the barrels and save the boys." No one doubts that if the pastors and church members in this city would unite as one man and say to the Government, "We demand the honest enforcement of the Prohibitory Law," that we should have a very different condition of things in the way of a sober town than we have had during the weeks past.

We need first of all an honest, alert, energetic prosecutor. This has become an urgent and imperative necessity. It is necessary for the maintenance of order and sobriety, for the respect and supremacy of law, for the moral security of the community. Such a prosecutor we have not had. Such the lawless liquor

sellers do not want. And we may be sure they will use their utmost endeavors to prevent his appointment. All governments are amenable to public opinion strongly expressed, and we have reason to hope that our present rulers would respect the honest, earnest and strongly supported demand of the temperance people in this matter. Clearly this is a matter which ought without delay to be pressed to an issue. Our first duty is to secure for the good law we have a fair trial by honest and fearless enforcement. Along with this may we not hope for renewed efforts by our churches and the temperance bodies along educational lines of moral question as well? This, too, is needed. In these ways we may reap great good from being stirred up by the pithy and eloquent words of the Black Knight.
