

# War Brings Unity To British Artists

 LONDON, Feb. 1.—(CP)—War has brought unity to British artists, ordinarily one of the world's most quarrelsome body of workers, and produced an exhibition which experts say is the most representative in the nation's history.

In the elaborate galleries of the Royal Academy of Arts in Piccadilly most of the prominent artists and a number of unknowns are exhibiting 2,210 works, paintings, drawings and sculptures and attracting around 6,000 visitors a week at 30 cents a head.

Proceeds of the United Artists' exhibition go to the Lord Mayors' Fund for the Red Cross, the St. John Ambulance Association, and the Artists' General Benevolent Institution.

The show opened without any of the usual British artistic rows and only one person played a joke on it.

Rowland Penrose, Surrealist, submitted a picture containing some printing which looked pretty shocking. The committee told Penrose they could not accept his work, but suggested he submit another. He did and it got into the show. That was the first time someone discovered the second picture, a composition of glove stretchers, meant in deaf-mute sign language something considerably more shocking than the subject mentioned in the print of the first one.

Nobody has turned any critical handspins about the show either way, but the most-mentioned thing about it is that it almost ignores the war. Scarcely a dozen pictures deal with warlike subjects. Of those which do the most striking are Rudolf H. Sauter's "Tommy's Mummy" and Vaselod Sorensen's "Souvenirs."

Sauter's work shows a man completely covered in gas mask and decontamination outfit of oilskin clothing and mitts. Sorensen's depicts a death flying over a Russian town while bombs fire it.

Norman Howard has an exciting picture of a naval battle, but it is the battle of Jutland, 6:35 P. M., May 31st, 1916.

#### WHY DOES ALCOHOL COME FROM FERMENTATION?

When a jar of fruit has worked, it means that air containing wild yeast germs has gained entrance to the jar, and fermentation has set up, forming alcohol and carbonic acid gas. The source of the alcohol is in the decomposition of the sugar. While the process is a natural one nevertheless it is true that alcohol produced in quantity only with the aid of man. This fact shows how foolish is the remark, "Since fermented wine is a good gift from God, it was intended to be drunk by man."

#### IS NOT FERMENTATION A PURELY NATURAL PROCESS?

Have you noticed that if you open a jar of fruit that is commencing to work and put it in a shallow bowl, thus exposing the fruit to the air, fermentation ceases? The wild yeast germ in the air is harmless until it begins to grow, and it begins to grow when it is shut up from the air in some sweet juice. Then the yeast germ takes the oxygen from the sugar and breaks it up into alcohol and carbon dioxide. Unless the sweet juice is shut up from the air in a deep jar or vat, little alcohol will be formed.

### 4. DO ALL ALCOHOLIC DRINKS HAVE AN ALCOHOLIC CONTENT OF LESS THAN 15%?

The alcoholic content by volume differs in different kinds of beverages; beer 4 percent; ale 7 percent; cider 9 percent; wine 11 percent.

### 5. IF FERMENTATION CEASES WHEN THE ALCOHOLIC CONTENT REACHED 15%, HOW CAN A WINE STRONGER THAN 15% BE OBTAINED?

By reducing the amount of water in fermented liquors by the process of distillation, stronger liquors or distilled spirits are obtained. When distilled spirits are added to wine it is said to be fortified. Thus fortified wine has an alcoholic content of over forty per cent; brandy and whiskey of over fifty per cent.

### QUEBEC ANNUAL REPORT

The Plan of Work for the New Year into which we have entered is composed of the following items:

1. Realizing that prayer for Divine guidance is the greatest source of power for all Christian organizations, we urge our local unions to make the devotional part of their meetings as spiritual and instructive as possible, also to remember the midnight hour of prayer.

2. That County and local unions endeavor to make a Provincial Life Member during the year.

3. That all children in a community be urged to study the lessons in the Temperance Educational Campaign; to write essays; to make posters; sign pledges and that interesting books on the harmful effects of alcohol and narcotics be put in Sunday schools and day school libraries and that children be induced to read them.

4. We urge each local Union to organize Loyal Temperance Societies and Young People's Societies wherever possible, failing that to work through Mission Bands, encouraging them to appoint Temperance Secretaries—also through Junior Red Cross Societies wherever possible.

5. That local Unions make a determined effort to increase their membership; holding special meetings with outstanding speakers for that purpose.

6. That we continue to protest

against "Government Control" of the sale of liquor, and in all possible ways show our disapproval of the same.

7. That Unions should not direct their funds to other objects or organizations. W.C.T.U. money is needed for W.C.T.U. work.

8. We urge our members to wear the white ribbon at all times and to be able to explain what it stands for.

9. Whereas the Press is a powerful ally in spreading propaganda of any kind, it is urged that local and county Unions urge their Press correspondents to try as far as possible to secure the co-operation of their local papers in bringing the cause of temperance before the public.

10. We urge that each local Union observe "Tidings" Day in November.

11. That we protest against the introduction of liquor in casinos.

12. That the local presidents see that all superintendents send their reports to the County Supt., so that these may be sent on to the Provincial Supt., and that this be done immediately after the annual meeting; also that the Provincial Supt. write at least once a year to the County Supt., preferably after Provincial Convention.

13. That it be arranged at County Conventions or School of Methods to make a study of our work.

14. That we advocate and support the formation of study groups, and the holding of study courses of war in the contemporary world, and the requirements of a lasting peace system, so that our citizens may be fitted to support their representatives in their efforts to bring about such a peace.

15. That we reconsider the Group System and try to find the best way of presenting reports to members of Convention.

16. That we continue our efforts to secure the vote for women in the Province of Quebec, co-operating with other organizations working for the same objective; also that we endeavour to impress upon our members and other women who have the right to vote on Municipal and School Board elections to do so at every opportunity.

17. We urge that each local Union make this Plan of Work the subject of special study, devoting five minutes of each meeting to the study of some part of the Report Book.
