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"Lazybones" is Outstanding Film Success
The regular monthly meeting of the Royal Edward Chapter of the I. O. D. E. was held in the Empire Room, Navy League Building yesterday afternoon, Regent Mrs. McCready, presiding.
After usual routine business plans were discussed for celebration of Orders Twenty Fifth Anniversary to be held St. Georges Day.
Chapter decided to hold Alexandra Rose Day 23rd of May Empire Day as usual.
Mrs. J. A. McMillan, Provincial Secretary submitted the following report:
Five of the six calendars on hand at the last meeting have been disposed of to Women's Institutes, who no doubt are placing them in the country schools.
Six packages of literature consisting of bulletins and programs of the National Conference on Education and Citizenship to be held in Montreal, April 5th-10th have been sent to members of the Royal Edward and Abegweit chapters.
A ten dollar library is being sent to this Province for the use of country schools for the remainder of the school year. After consultation with the Superintendent of Education the schools selected to receive the library were, in order, with an enrollment of fifty pupils and average attendance of thirty-five, and Brooklyn where Mr. Nathan Bears the teacher conducts a most successful night school for the adults of the community. The teachers of these schools are willing to be responsible for the care and safe return of the books. All transportation expenses are paid by head office. This is just the beginning of this scheme and we are anxious it should work out well as it will be a great boon to the country schools to have the use of these libraries.
Most appreciative letters have been received from Mrs. Ives, President of the Montague Institute Mrs. Anderson, Secretary of Fern Wood Institute, The Reverend Mr. Crofton of Georgetown and Mr. Lewis Lowther, Principal of Kennington school for the War Memorial pictures sent to them. They have all written most enthusiastically of the pictures and signified their intention of having them suitably framed and hung in their school rooms.
Every effort has been made to secure a candidate for the I. O. D. E. Bursary for 1926 but so far there is no one in sight. Notices have been posted in Prince of Wales College and at St. Dunstan's University. In addition to this twenty-seven memoranda, explaining the Bursaries, have been sent direct to mothers and guardians of eligible children. With these were enclosed circular letters asking the ages of the children in their care, their grade in school and the probability of their applying for a Bursary at some future time. This was done that the guardians may know of this splendid opportunity awaiting their children and be encouraged to keep them in school.
Communications from Child Welfare, Ottawa were read, also from Navy League and Education War Memorial Fund.
Meeting adjourned.

A large audience present last evening in the hall of the Conservatory of Music had another demonstration of a notably satisfying kind as to the possibilities musically in our young people. On this evening was held a pupils' recital, and at least one performer of the program, a child regarded by her teacher as a quite wonderful ability, was scarcely twelve years of age—Miss Kathleen Logan, violin while another—Miss Christabel McIntosh, (piano) is barely thirteen, and is already displaying brilliant musical gift. The program has already been published in The Evening Mail, the composers represented being Heller, Chopin, Caldara, Leclair, Speaks, Dancla, Ganz Grieg, Pearl Curran, Dvorak, Liszt, d'Albert, Campagnoli-Pochen, Wieniawski, Debussy, Cowen, Sabiner and Loefl.

THE MARKETS
MONTREAL Que., Mar. 29.—The demand for the United Kingdom and the continent for Canadian grain on the Montreal market today continued steady, but the volume of business accomplished was small, there being only an odd load of oats sold at an advance of 3d per quarter on Saturday bids for early shipment. In sympathy with the lower prices for oats in the Winnipeg future market local spot prices for car lots were reduced one cent per bushel but even at this reduction the demand for domestic and export account was limited and the trade was quiet. With reference to the ocean grain freight rate it was reported that another tramp vessel was engaged today to load a full cargo of grain or May shipment from the port of Montreal to the continent at 12-2 cents per 100 pounds for heavy grain which makes two vessels taken so far this season. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were well maintained under a quiet demand. The undertone to the market for all lines of milled wheat was firm and the trade volume was moderate. Standard grades of rolled oats were steady. The feature of the potato market was the stronger feeling that developed and prices advanced 20 to 40 cents per bag which makes a net rise within the past few days of 50 to 85 cents per bag. This was attributed to the increased demand from the United States. The trade in eggs was fair and prices were unchanged. The butter market was quiet and firm. The volume of business transacted in cheese was small but prices were unchanged.
