#### Latest from Summerside and Prince County,

THE matter of changing the evening hour of service in the Summerside Methodist church from 6.30 to 7 p. m. was brought before the congregation Sunday night and by standing vote was decided unanimously to make the change. The Presbyterian congregation has also decided to make the change. It is understood that the other churches will do likewise.

THE Stanley made a splendid run yesterday. The steamer left Summerside at 9.44 a. m., arrived at Cape Tormentine at 11.15 left on return at 12.42, and arrived here at 2.25 p. m. There were 14 passengers going and the following freight: 310 bags oats, 200 boxes smelts, nine quarters beef, a quantity of poultry and sundries. There were some passengers on the return trip, beside a quantity of mixed freight.

It is considered that it would be a judicious move on the part of the Board of Trade to have posters placed in the chief railway centres and hotels in the sister provinces to the effect that the str. Stanley is playing regularly on the Summerside Cape Tormentine route. In this manner there would be less uncertainty on the part of the travelling public as to the best means of making connections between this province and the mainland. It is also suggested that the Board make an effort to have dispatches forwarded daily to Sackville and have the same posted in the railway station there stating the Stanley's hour of departure from this port and the probable connections to be made at the Cape during the winter season. The lack of information to be obtained at Sackville in reference to the steamer's movements is a regrettable source of injury to this route.
