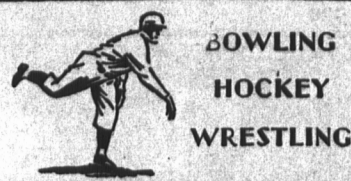

"ISLANDERS" WIN MARITIME HOCKEY TITLE

Swamp Halifax All Star Ladies' Hockey Team In Sudden Death Game 8-0

HALIFAX, March 28—(CP)—A powerful, smooth-working team, Charlottetown Islanders swamped Halifax All-Stars 8-0 here tonight in a sudden-death game for the Maritime women's hockey championship. The Islanders will meet the central Canadian winners in a title series at Charlottetown for the Lady Beesborough Trophy.

Faster skaters and better stick-handlers, the Island girls took a two-goal lead in the first period, added another tally in the second and ran wild to score five times in the third period.

Leading Scorers

Edna McInnis and Margaret Gallant, with three goals each, were the leading scorers. Vimy Jones, hand-shooting pivot player, scored once and figured on two other goals.

Tonight's triumph was the second Maritime hockey title for Charlottetown. Royals won the junior championship.

Edna McInnis tallied for Charlottetown shortly after the 11-minute mark of the first period and was followed six minutes later by Margaret Gallant. Near the end of the second period, Miss Jones got the third Island goal.

Jenny Cudmore started off the third-period rampage when 15 seconds of the period elapsed. Four minutes later Edna McInnis followed her. Then Margaret Gallant banged in two fast goals, followed by Edna McInnis' last counter.

Mrs. Myrtle MacDonald in the Charlottetown goal had a comparatively easy time of it. Merle Mitchell in the Halifax nets turned in a good game. She made about 30 stops in the first period alone.

Day Regarded No Pushover For Armstrong

NEW YORK, March 28—Proof that Henry Armstrong, the welterweight Czar, no longer is considered unbeatable along Tin Elly Alley was offered today when the odds on his fight with Davey Day dropped to 2 to 1 in favor of the champion.

Takes Toll

Henry was a more substantial favorite before he licked Barney Ross and Lou Ambers for the welterweight and lightweight titles. There is plenty of Day money and prevailing opinion is Henry's three years of almost continuous mauling have taken their toll.

Day's cheering section of managers Sam Plan and Art Winch and ex-champion Barney Ross may have something to do with it. The betting boys get an earful of the trio in full voice and then whittle the price. Armstrong was a 4 to 1 favorite when he came to town last week.

Fresh Money

Day had been working out only a couple of days when the price dropped to 3 to 1. Now it is 2 to 1.

The lanky Ohioan helped too. He looks good. He is a tall boy for a welter, five foot eight. He moves in with his hands close to his body and fires away. His best punch is a right uppercut, which is the punch Ambers cut Henry with. He is durable, too, for such a slim fellow. He has never been stopped.

Just The Time

"Lookit! Davey said, after a workout yesterday. "Armstrong has been fighting 10 years, about twice a month for the last three years and no one knows how much before that. All the guys I know says he can't be licked. He probably don't think so himself. That's the time he can get licked and I'll do it."

Rangers Halt Bruins 2-1 In Hectic Penalty-ridden Game On New York Ice

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, March 28—New York Rangers halted the Boston Bruins tonight with a 2-1 victory over the Bruins in a game which kept the Stanley Cup playoffs back to Boston for a fifth game Thursday in the best-of-seven series between the National Hockey League's first and second teams.

For three successive defeats in the playoffs at the hands of the Bruins—2-1, 3-2, and 4-1—the Rangers scored their first triumph of the series with a game of wide open, suggest hockey which kept in constant turmoil the crowd of 15,692 in Madison Square Garden.

Eight major penalties were called for fighting in the first period. Boston's only goal was scored by Milt Schmidt on passes from Bobby Bauer and Woody Dumart when the game was only 49 seconds old. From then on the Rangers played aggressive hockey and allowed little scope for the Bruins to attack.

The Blue Shirts tied the count midway through the first period when Max Colville batted an accurately-gauged pass from Al Shibicky, who had taken the puck from Bill Carse along the right wing.

Scores Winner

After 10 minutes of the second frame Lynn Patrick scored the winning goal on a play with Clint Smith and Ott Heller. The Bruins protested that the puck went past goalie Frank Brimsek off Patrick's skate and held up the game fully five minutes while they argued the point.

Mickey Lonn—the referee who dealt out a 20-minute match penalty to Dave Schirmer in last week's Americans-Toronto game—ruled in favor of the Bruins.

Leafs Defeat Red Wings 4-1 In Series Opener

TORONTO, March 28—Striking in the first two periods through Nick Metz and Gordon Drillon, Toronto Maple Leafs sped to a 4-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings tonight in the first game of their Stanley Cup semi final series.

There was little punch to the hockey the Red Wings showed until Metz and Drillon had scored twice. Then Marty Barry punched home a power play goal and Detroit attacked only spasmodically the rest of the way.

Though the lead got three of their goals while the visitors were shorthanded, last year's National League champions might have nabbed twice that many while the Wings were at full strength if it hadn't been for the brilliant goaltending of Tiny Thompson. The veteran netminder was the only really effective member of the Leafs' back division.

Pete Langelle assisted Metz in the first Toronto goal and Syl Apps and Murph Chamberlain drew points on the other three goals in mass plays while Detroit was a man short. Victory boosted the odds on the Leafs to 2 to 1 to something like 4 to 1.

Metz' goal that opened the scoring after five minutes, was the priciest of the night. He took the puck from Langelle at mid-field, pulled Doug Young and Bruce Jones to one side, and then shot between them to hang the puck behind Thompson on a low drive. For the third time this season an Island squad has brought a Maritime hockey title to the Province and congratulations are in order to the "Islanders", that smart girls' hockey squad who last night came through with their convincing sudden-death victory in Halifax to lift the Maritime crown and earn for themselves a place in the Dominion finals against the winners of the Western Canada-Upper Canada series.

Just how the "Islanders" will compare with their finalist opponents is hard to figure out. Preston Rivulettes, champions now for the past half dozen years at least, are favored to turn back the challenge of the Western champions and these Rivulettes are the same team that last year beat the Islanders in two straight games at Galt, Ont.

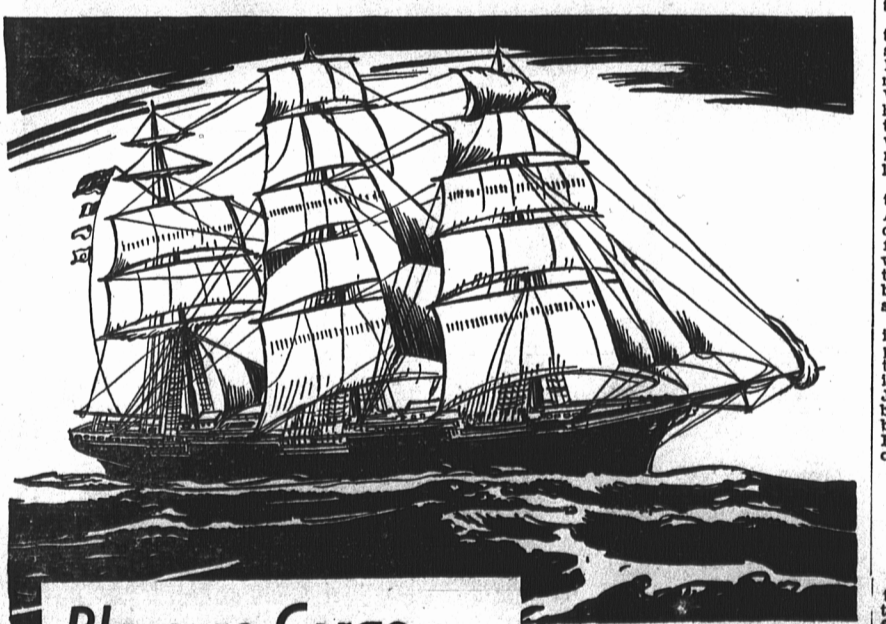
