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Cards Ace Has Chance To Win 20 Games

NEW YORK, Sept. 5—(AP)—Howie Pollet, smooth-working St. Louis Cardinal, although he may yet become the nation's League's first and perhaps only, 20 game winner for 1946.

The slim southpaw from New Orleans was forced to forego his regular turn on the mound against Chicago Cubs Wednesday night because of a severe cold. He was improved today, however, and manager Eddie Over said he might be able to use him in the double-header with Pittsburgh Sunday.

The 26-year-old ace of the Cardinals mound staff has 18 victories, and with three weeks of the season left, he should have little trouble in racking up two more. The feat would make him the first left-hander to win 20 or more in the circuit since Carl Hubbell and Cliff Melton did it for the 1937 pennant-winning New York Giants.

Pollet's nearest rival for 20 game honors is Johnny Sain of the Boston Braves, who has 16.

Campbell Is Bit Dazed By Appointment

MONTREAL, Sept. 5—(CP)—Clarence S. Campbell has gained a high marshal status in his rehabilitation from Lieutenant-Colonel in the Canadian army in president of the National Hockey League.

The 41-year-old, bachelor lawyer from Edmonton assumed his duties today as head of the world's largest professional hockey organization and admitted he was somewhat "dazed" by the suddenness of it all.

Dutton, who has proclaimed frequently since becoming president after the death of Frank Calder in 1935 that his job was only temporary stepped down from the N.H.L. leadership at the league's semi-annual meeting here yesterday.

Campbell, only recently returned to civilian life, stepped up at an undisclosed salary as third president of the league and came into being in 1917 under Calder.

The new president's hockey background dates to his early days in the west where he guarded the nets for the college team. A Rhodes scholarship sent him to Oxford University and on his return to Edmonton to practise law he found time to further the interests of the ice game in that city.

Campbell didn't stick to promoting, however, and in the early 1930's became a referee in the western league. He served three years as N.H.L. referee, starting in 1936, and a brief period in the Amateur Hockey League before joining the army.

The \$5,000 program for Goodwill Races next Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 11th and 12th, has attracted the largest entry list in the five years these races have been held. In fact the figures are not too far away from those of Old Home Week as close to a hundred horses are entered in the ten events for the two-day meet. Thirty of these are in the two, three and four year old futurities and judging by reports coming in most of these colts will start.

The two-year-old class will be exceptionally good as they are so evenly matched in speed. The 3-year-olds have had several opportunities of racing this year on various Maritime tracks and they too will put up a bang-up contest.

In the 4-year-old futurity there are such stars as Prince Budlong, 2:12 1-2, June Morning, 2:13, Lucky Number, 2:16, Quaker's Boy, 2:15, to mention just a few.

Between 65 and 70 horses are entered in the remaining seven events which range from a free for all to a 2:25 pace.
