## FRIDAY

**SPECIAL TRAIN.**—Yesterday the Railway people ran a special train to Cape Traverse taking the mails and passengers for that place from the city. She left here at 4 p.m. and returned at 12.50, bringing mails and passengers for the city with her.

**TEA AND SALE.**—A most successful tea and sale was held in St. Paul's School-room yesterday from five to seven, under the auspices of the Women's Missionary Aid Society of the church. A large number of people were present and the aprons sold rapidly. The tea was a delightful affair—all the goodies that the mind can conjure up were there in abundance and those present enjoyed the afternoon thoroughly.

**RESIDENCE BURNED.**—Mr. Ernest Jenkins, of Birch Hill met with a serious loss on Monday evening of this week in the destruction of his residence and all its contents by fire. The fire is supposed to have originated in a defective chimney and before it was discovered had made such progress that absolutely nothing could be done to save either the building or any of its contents. Through the kind assistance of neighbors the outbuildings were saved with great difficulty.

**SCHOOL OF EXPRESSION.**—Last evening the opening promenade of the Charlottetown School of Expression, under the direction of Miss Bertha F. M. Gorman, was formally held in St. George's hall by a reception at 8 o'clock and a dance at 9. Among the patronesses were mesdames R. H. Morton, A. G. Peake, S. R. Jenkins and R. J. Ledwell. Quite a number were present at the occasion at the conclusion of which Miss Hazel Bronner gave a solo in her delightful way.

**MODERATE PROSPECTS.**—Prospects for a diminution of the bitter cold that has oppressed the Island and, in fact, the whole continent, for the past few days are indicated by a rise in temperature, and moderate weather may be expected shortly. Great hardships have been experienced everywhere during that time by the prevalence of fires due to overheated stoves and furnaces. Fifty-nine fires in New York drove hundreds of persons into the streets at night clad only in night apparel. As a direct result of the abnormal conditions nine persons had died and many are critically ill in the hospitals. In Lake Michigan three steamships are ice-bound with no immediate prospects of release. Their crews and passengers are well supplied with food and fuel but there is danger of the vessels being grounded to powder by the ice. In Montreal the distinct rise in the temperature is being hailed with relief. In Kingston during the two days of the storm the mercury dropped to twenty-two degrees below zero. The wind was keen and cutting and intensified the cold. It made the people hop about with liveliness. In Brockville twenty-eight was the official record. Cornwallites experienced thirty degrees below. First-hites were prevalent at Perth, thirty-four being the official temperature registered. St. John, N. B., had the lowest record of years, twenty below. Montreal showed twenty-one, Fredericton twenty-two, Woodstock thirty and Grand Falls thirty-five. At St. Hyacinth thirty-four degrees; at Sherbrooke East forty-three, Oxford Road forty-five. From these places no accidents are reported. Charlottetown and the Island generally escaped much of the severity of this cold snap, the lowest in the city being 14 below and through the country, in certain unsheltered districts, thirty-two below was the lowest, as far as can be learned.

## MONDAY

**OLD FRIEND'S ARRIVAL.**—Mr. Dan E. McLean formerly ledgerkeeper in the Bank of New Brunswick, Kensington, but now employed in the Bank of Nova Scotia, O'Leary, arrived in Kensington Thursday afternoon with his skates on his shoulder; and an eager look in his eye. **DEATH OF MISS BEARISTO.**—The death of Miss Elizabeth Bearisto, of the Bearisto House, George street, took place about two o'clock this morning, after an illness of several weeks. The late Miss Bearisto was in her 74th year, and has been in Sydney for the past fourteen years, when she arrived from Summerside, P. E. I., and since which time she has with her sisters continued to reside at the Bearisto House, says a Sydney exchange. She was a daughter of the late William Bearisto of Summerside. She is survived by two sisters in Sydney, the Misses Martha and Agnes, and also by relatives in Summerside.

**EXCITING INCIDENT.**—A rather exciting and somewhat dangerous incident, occurred on Commercial Street, Kensington, Thursday morning, when a fattened ox, which had been driven a long distance before it reached town, became infuriated with rage, and only for the street being very slippery no doubt, would have made it rather hot for some of the onlookers, even though it was a frosty morning. Indeed, as it was, some of them ran into nearby shops, while others scaled the higher snow-banks. The result was that the animal which became entirely unmanageable at last had to be killed right on the street, which was in an icy condition where he slipped and fell.

**LATE MRS ANGUS McDONALD.**—The death took place at the residence of her brother-in-law, Mr. Gillis, Clernont, on Friday night of Mrs. Angus McDonald, relict of the late Mr. Angus McDonald, formerly of Summerside. The deceased formerly Miss Agnes McGuilvary, was a native of Roilo Bay and was 97 years of age. Since the death of her husband, she resided in Summerside, until about a year ago when she removed to Clernont. Of the large family of sons and daughters only four survive her, one of whom, James, a conductor in the Western division of the C. P. R., spent some time visiting his mother last summer.

**CASE WITHDRAWN.**—When the case of the McNutt Oyster Company against Messrs. Champion and Thompson, which has been before Stipendiary Wright's Court for some weeks past, came up yesterday afternoon, Mr. Bentley for the plaintiff informed the Court that the case had been settled. The case was therefore withdrawn. No terms of settlement were made public as far as is known.—J.

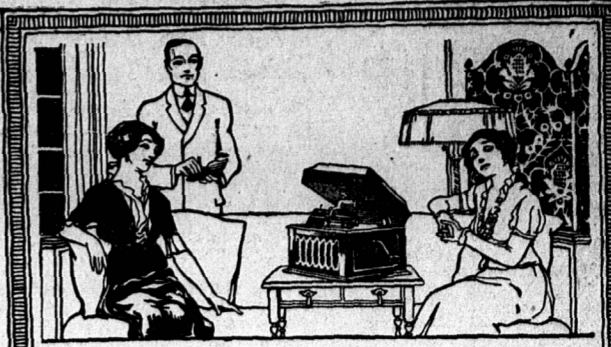

**THE STORM.**—Tuesday morning Summerside was visited by the worst storm of the season, and one of the worst for some years. It commenced about one a.m., and continued until about noon, when it somewhat abated. A heavy wind and drift continued until the evening, when it became colder. The streets were in places almost impassable, while on Water street, the snow banks on the north side are from 15 to 12 feet deep in places.
