—BRANDON, Suffolk, Eng.—Men demolishing a house found three George II-golden sovereigns, a George IV sovereign and a George III half-sovereign buried in debris.

—In asking the heavy punishment Andre Montpetit, R.C., told the court there was a link between Patrice Dubuc, a Rachel Street merchant, and a branch bank manager and that a packing-house employee also figured in the operations.

Dubuc, who has admitted violation of Prices Board regulations, will be sentenced Oct. 31.

Mr. Montpetit said that Dubuc, in a declaration to police admitted procuring for the packinghouse employee between 300 and 400 coupons. For every 100 coupons Dubuc got from 75 cents to \$1.25. After purchase of the butter, the coupons, or bank cheques, were returned to a branch manager of the Banque Provinciale du Canada and later destroyed.

Mr. Montpetit said Dubuc admitted having paid \$50 or \$60 a week to the bank manager over a six-month period as payment for balancing the ration account. On this basis, the prosecutor estimated Dubuc obtained between 300,000 and 400,000 coupons illegally.

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The radio receiving systems that have been installed in the Summerside High School and St. Mary's Academy by the Kinmen Club were inaugurated yesterday at both schools by short programs conducted from the central offices over the public address system. At the High School, Mr. Clarence Mercer, the supervisor, acted as master of ceremonies and introduced the speakers, Mr. Harold E. Gaudet, club president, opened his remarks by telling the students the purpose of the Kinmen organization and outlined to them the service work that the Summerside club had done since the formation of the club. Of the different projects carried out the one of which the club was most proud was the installation of radio systems in the schools.

"We feel," he said, "that it will be of real value to you boys and girls and to many others that will follow you in bringing into your classrooms expert teachers from a wide area. It should also be of assistance to your authorities in making announcements and giving out information which they desire you to have." He told them that these installations had cost the club \$1,800.00 part of which has yet to be raised. In conclusion he asked for the good will of the boys and girls towards the Kinmen Club at all times.

He was followed by Mr. D.O. Stewart, chairman of the board of school trustees, who on behalf of the board extended thanks to the club for installing this valuable equipment. He cited ways in which it could be used to the advantage of the pupils. He also asked the children to support the Shell-Out campaign as evidence of their appreciation. Miss Ann Morrison, a pupil, spoke on behalf of the students and said that they were already receiving much value from the equipment and also a considerable amount of enjoyment. She pledged the support of her fellow students in the Shell-Out campaign.

Mr. Maurice Mill, chairman of the committee in charge of the Shell-Out tickets spoke after and explained how it worked. He said the money raised by this means would be used to help pay for this equipment by means of which he was addressing them. Grades five to eight would participate and door to door selling would commence on Saturday. He told them they should bring their money to the school on Halloween Night and bring them to the school by seven o'clock where there would be entertainment and treats for them. He asked them to avoid damaging people's property on that night and to be courteous and manly in selling the tickets. In conclusion, Mr. Mercer promised her support in the campaign.—S
