TO JUDGE LIVE FOXES.—Mr. Chester McLure, manager of the P. E. Island Fur Sales Board, received an invitation yesterday to be a judge at an exhibition of live silver foxes to be held in Boston on December 10th and 11th next. This is the first show of the kind ever held in America. It is being held under the auspices of the American Fox Breeders Association. The other judge will be Dr. Ned Dearborn of Washington, who has charge of the Experimental Fox Station of the United States. Already fifty entries have been made and accommodation has been made for over one hundred entries. FORWARD MOVEMENT LUNCHEON.—Some forty of the men of St. James and Zion congregations attended a luncheon given in St. James' Hall at 1 o'clock yesterday in connection with the Forward Movement. Judge Stewart presided. The repast was a splendid one reflecting the highest credit upon the ladies of St. James congregation who were responsible for it. After all had done full justice to the good things provided, an address was delivered by Rev. R. W. Ross, of Halifax, organizer of the Forward Movement for the Presbyterian church. After voicing his pleasure at meeting the men of the churches Mr. Ross stated that the prospects of the Forward Movement were exceedingly good and that already very encouraging progress was being made. He explained that in connection with the Movement was to be a great Peace Thanksgiving which the church is to make. The church must be put on a war basis and men must give with all their hearts in the great work of reconstruction. MILITARY COUP AGAINST AUSTRIAN GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN FRUSTRATED VIENNA, Nov. 4.—A military coup against the government, which thus far has been frustrated, was exposed at a general meeting of the Socialist party last night. Documents made public show that the attempt was set for nine o'clock in the evening of October 25, when organized companies and battalions of the reactionary elements were to seize the bridges and isolate the city, then advance and occupy the town hall, police headquarters, the armories and other strategic buildings and positions. The national guard was to be disarmed and likewise the workingmen's armed organizations. Pass-words were provided and orders were issued that weapons were not to be used unless necessary, and then without quarter. The details even provided for the number of machine guns and bombers and other dispositions.
