Islander's Impressions Of California

The following letter was addressed to Mr. Austin in Cuffs, Middleton, and was written by his grandfather, Mr. T. J. Humphrey, who with Mrs. Humphrey, is spending a well-earned vacation in sunny California. Los Angeles, Jan. 5, 1927. Dear Austin,—I am going to try and write you a few lines from this great City, but any description I can give will only give you a faint idea of the beauties and vastness of the place. Among the first surprises I got when coming here was the tremendous automobile traffic. On the main Avenues there is a steady stream of cars often two tier deep on either side, and at the crossing the traffic is regulated by automatic signals, which operate a sign telling when to stop and when to go. At other crossings a cop stands in the middle of the street and directs the traffic. And then the size of the City. When I tell you the population is about 1,250,000, (one million two hundred and fifty thousand) you may form some idea of how many houses it would take to accommodate that number of people. Then this city is surrounded with other towns and cities, such as Alhambra, San Gabriel, Town of Temple, Pasadena, Altadena, Long Beach and others. Yesterday we had a beautiful drive to Long Beach (about twenty-seven miles). Your Grandma and I and Mr. H. D. MacGregor and his wife were taken out in a nice closed car by a real estate agent and when we got to the harbour which is a man made harbour, a steam yacht was waiting to take us for a sail. This yacht could accommodate about one hundred people and was fitted to capacity, all seated on chairs. When we started, a man stood up in front of us with a megaphone, and described in detail the scenery to our right on the way out, and thus to our right on our way in. This is a narrow harbour and has been dredged to a depth of 40 ft, which will accommodate the largest vessel afloat. When we got back to the wharf we were driven around the business section of the town, and taken to a large tent and given a free lunch. After that we had a lecture on the opportunities of making money by investing in real estate in this part of the town, and then we were shown the location of the lots they had to sell, and they sure tried hard to sell them. This is the method they take to advertise their property and they claim it is cheaper than newspaper or advertising. Well, Austin, we had a fine time coming out here. It just took us a day and a half days. We had to change cars three times, first at Sackville, then Montreal, and then Chicago. From Chicago to California we had the same conductor. The Dodds' Medicine Co., Ltd., and the same porters. We had

the best of accommodations, our drawing room was a little small, but we had the use of all the observation cars, radio cars, and the best there was on the train. The weather here is delightful. There was rain three days the first week we were here, but since then the sun shines every day, and is just as warm as it is in June at home. Mr. and Mrs. Simmons were over to see us last evening. They have a furnished room about nine blocks from us. The evening was as happy as any I have had and is to speak at the Canadian club on Feb. 5th. Our address is 1656 West 55th St., Los Angeles, California. We are listening to the radio and got all kinds of entertainment. Have heard Amee Semple McPherson several times. GRANDPA
