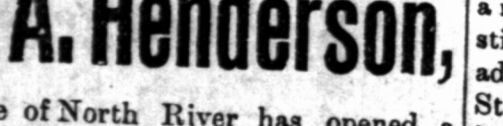

THE WAR.

The inactivity of the two principal British armies in South Africa since the repulse of General Buller at Tugela may now be considered as having been ordered from London. The fact is that since the determination was arrived at to send out Generals Roberts and Kitchener no aggressive movement has been attempted. They have now arrived in Cape Town and it will take some days at least for them to become fully informed on the spot as to existing conditions. We need not therefore expect any immediate forward movement either at Tugela or Modder River.

There may possibly now be an entire change of plan. And it is known that in view of the strength of the Boer positions which block our advance, the conviction has become wide-spread that the numbers of our troops are inadequate, that more and heavier artillery, a large increase in the cavalry arm and much more effective land transport are imperative. We know with what long-drawn patience Gen. Kitchener prepared before he struck at the Dervish forces in the Sudan and how effective the blow was when it came. A little reflection will therefore prepare us for such further delays as the existing exigencies will permit before a general advance is again attempted.

How it may fare with Kimberly and Ladysmith in the meantime we can only conjecture, but it is satisfactory to know that the relief armies are in both cases within signalling distance and our commanders will be kept fully informed as to their exigencies. The information they possess in that regard cannot, for obvious reasons, be made public. The eager millions of the Empire must possess their souls in patience in the meantime. What we know is that our now large effective fighting force will be considerably increased within the weeks to come; that the ablest generals of the Empire are now at the front and that their very best will be done to solve a most difficult and perplexing problem.

ASYLUM, JAIL AND POOR HOUSE.

Again a Grand Jury has spoken, following the deliverance of another Grand Jury six months ago, with a Royal Commission sandwiched in between. And still the Asylum is as overcrowded, and the Poor House ditto, with one room occupied by four "in a scandalous condition." There is a gleam of light in regard to the Jail which has been scrubbed and a year's accumulation of unwashed blankets have been cleansed. Fortunately, too, there are fewer inmates than formerly in this institution. A man may keep out of Jail usually, if he will. Not every one, can avoid being brought to the Asylum or even to the Poor House.

The fact remains that not one of these provincial institutions will bear a moment's comparison with the institutions for like purposes in the adjoining Provinces or the United States. And what is being done to improve them? Apparently we must wait till the twentieth century for any substantial changes and improvements such as are required. Jail and Poor House buildings are utterly unfit for the uses to which they are put. As for the Asylum it is so overcrowded that if all else were as it should be and otherwise than it is, it could not possibly be ranked as a place for curing mental maladies.

A GROWING BANK.

And Will Shortly Have a New Name.

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—Mr. Gardner, manager of the local branch of the Merchant Bank of Halifax, has received official confirmation Saturday of the retirement of Mr. D.H. Duncan, general manager of the bank, and the appointment of Mr. E. L. Pease as his successor.

Mr. Gardner informed the Free Press Saturday that under the new management a number of important changes were proposed. At the next session of parliament an application will be made for an act to change the name of the bank to the Royal Bank of Canada. The bank having developed out of its provincial localism, a name of a more general character has been deemed desirable. Another change will be the removal of the new general manager's quarters from Halifax to Montreal, though the head office will still remain in Halifax.

Artillery Horses.

BOWMANVILLE, Ont., Jan. 10.—Fully a thousand men were assembled around the Balmoral Hotel Friday in response to an advertisement for horses for South Africa. Major Massey of Kingston, accompanied by a rough rider, was the buyer for the Government, and he selected and bought 18 fine animals out of the large number offered. The stamp of horse that finds favor with Major Massey is one weighing upwards of 1200 pounds, standing from 15.2 to 16 hands and between 5 and 10 years (11). Such are the requirements of the artillery horse.

To Use Marconi System.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The Marconi system will be in practical use in a few weeks by all steamers of the South-eastern and Chatham railway company sailing between Dover and Calais and Folkestone and Boulogne. One pier will be erected in Dover and will command both the right crossing the channel or in port on the other side. By this arrangement boats can be in instant touch with the shore during the voyage.
