NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE RESTRICTIONS DO NOT APPLY TO

Female domestic help and employment wanted ads where not more than one servant employed nor to advertisements for men over 65 and under 16 years of age, women over 60 and under 16 years of age, ministers, teachers, casual labor, part time subsidiary employment, non-residents as part time workers up to 54 hours weekly, nurses, farm hands, fishermen, domestic and kitchen help, required for hospitals and philanthropic institutions, students at work after school or on holidays other than long summer vacation, and any kind of "Help Wanted" advertisement from any Provincial Government.

NOTE: Domestic and Kitchen help required for hospitals and philanthropic institutions is now included in the above exempted group. Also the age for women has been lowered to enable those over 60 to seek employment without reference to National Selective Service.

NEW REGULATIONS FOR PART TIME HELP — You may now advertise directly for housewives to work up to 24 hours weekly. Such advertising is not subject to National Selective Service restrictions.

As there is no limit to the number of hours considered part time, but such copy must state that applicant has other full time work.

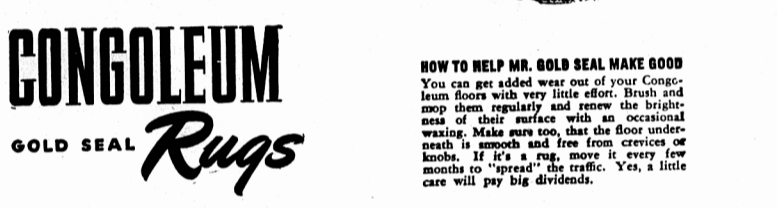

52 Decorations To Canadians in Sicily Campaign

list of recipients but the sappers of the Royal Canadian Engineers, who had difficulty and dangerous work to do in clearing minefields, repairing smashed bridges and roads in order to permit the fighting units to make their advances, did particularly well.

The Engineers collected a total of nine decorations, including the D. S. O. for their commander, Lt. Col. Geoffrey Walsh of Oakville, Ont., and a company commander, Lt. Kenneth Southern of Port Arthur. The Engineers also received three military crosses and four military medals.

Five decorations each went to members of the Canadian Artillery, the Canadian Armored Corps, the Seaforth Highlanders of Vancouver, and Quebec's noted French speaking battalion The Royal 22nd.

The Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment and the Royal Edmonton Regiment collected four each; the Royal Canadian Regiment, 48th Highlanders of Canada and York Regiment, two each, and Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, one. One man's unit was not available.

First Since Dieppe

It was the first big bestowal of decorations for the army since units of the 2nd Division received honors for their fighting in the Battle of Dieppe in August, 1942. All the awards are immediate; that is to say, they were granted by the commanders in the field, subject to subsequent approval by the King.

The list, which brings the Army's total of decorations for the war to 264, is not believed to be exceeded other awards for Sicily service will be announced later as recommendations from commanders are reviewed and acted upon by the military authorities.

In the 39 day Sicilian campaign the 1st Division collected 52 decorations against the 85 awarded men of the 2nd Division for their seven hour bloody fight at Dieppe in the main bestowal of Dieppe decorations. In addition, other awards for Dieppe announced since the main list have brought the total for that action, apart from mention and commendations, to 98.

The Dieppe list included one Victoria Cross, 13 Distinguished Service Orders, 13 Distinguished Conduct Medals, 20 Military Crosses and 51 Military Medals. There were also 24 mentions in dispatches. It is expected a considerable number of "mentions", which rank as decorations, will be announced later for Sicily.

Infantry battalion commanders, Lt. Col. Bruce Sutcliffe of Trenton, of the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment, who was killed, and Lt. Col. J. Jefferson of Edmonton, of the Royal Edmonton received the D. S. O. Other: D. S. O.'s went to Lt. Col.

Eric L. Booth of Toronto, with the 12th Army Tank Regiment from Three Rivers, Que.; Maj. George A. Welsh, the fighting postmaster of Sunderland, Ont., Royal Canadian Artillery, whose anti tank gunners destroyed pillboxes at a junction named "Sticky Corner"; and Maj. Henry Bell Irving, Vancouver athlete who is with the Seaforth Highlanders.

Cpl. William F. Kay, a native of Dundas, Ont., whose wife lives in England, was wounded in earning the D. C. M. by leading a section of the 48th Highlanders in wiping out a strong enemy company position.

The other two D. C. M.'s went to Pte. Joseph Origas of Montreal and Worcester, Mass., with the Royal Canadian Regiment, and Pte. Maurice Brisson of Edmundston, N. B., with the Carleton and Yorks.

A second posthumous decoration, besides that to Col. Sutcliffe, was the award of the Military Cross to Acting Capt. Leo Bouchard of Quebec. He died while leading his company of the Royal 22nd on Santa Maria Hill outside Catanzaro.

Typical of the work done by the Engineers in clearing paths for the infantry in the Sicilian advance is the story of Lieut. William K. Herno of Asbestos, Que., who won the Military Cross.

Three miles south of Assero Canadian tanks ran into a heavy concentration of mines. One was blown up and three were left stranded, unable to move forward, or backwards for fear of setting off hidden explosives. From the hills around, German mortars started shelling the position and it was expected German field guns further back would soon get the range.

Heron led a platoon in under the shrapnel from the mortars and in two hours cleared lanes which enabled the trapped tanks to escape.

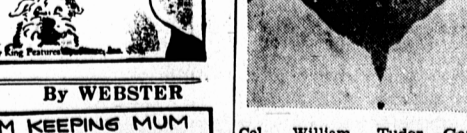

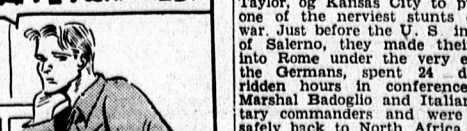
