Fred Bearisto for several years employed in the office of R. T. Holman leaves this morning for Winnipeg where a good position awaits him. Mr. Bearisto is one of Summerside's popular young men and his departure will be felt with deep regret.

Henry J. Matthews, Alberton, lost on Sunday his fourteen month old June Day colt which he valued highly and which was the admiration of many. The animal was frightened by a dog and became entangled in a large wire fence which caused death in less than a half an hour.

The catch of mackerel at Alberton on Saturday was again a large one. James Tuplin came in with a boat load of 20 barrels which he netted just off the harbor. Another boat had about 15 barrels from six nets. Catches yesterday ranged from 15 to 20 barrels to each boat. "Cod fishing is of minor importance while the blue backs are here" so says the jubilant fisherman.

The I. O. Foresters of Summerside will commemorate the anniversary of the order by attending divine service in the Baptist Church next Sunday evening when Rev. J. D. Wetmore will preach a sermon appropriate to the occasion. All members of Courts Chautauque and Cabot and visiting brethren are requested to meet at Foresters Hall at 6.30 p. m. sharp to join in procession to the church. Companions are respectfully invited to attend the service.

The regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last night with all members except J. L. Read present. The St. Vincent de Paul Society was granted a rebate of \$9 on rent of Market Hall. Neil McQuarrie was re-appointed a member of the board of school trustees. The police were instructed to make a thorough inspection of the town with a view to having all unsanitary conditions removed.

On motion it was decided to issue debentures for \$2000 for the opening of Summer Street and the purchase of a right of way re same. By resolution it was decided to pay into the Court the amount of \$2000 for the purchase of the Fanning property and that the Council proceed forthwith to open the street. The matter of getting information re the cost of water works and sewerage and other matters were informally considered and the Council adjourned.

The case of Nelson Howatt vs A. A. Lefurgey was before the election court held in Summerside yesterday. Chief Justice Sullivan and Judge Fitzgerald presiding. The counsel in behalf of the respondent applied for rule nisi to set aside an order for substituted service made by Mr. Justice Hodgson on account of the respondent being out of Canada and that the order setting the matter down for trial and notice of trial be set aside on the ground that the Judge had no jurisdiction in making the order and that substituted service cannot be made when the respondent is out of Canada. The Attorney for the petitioner argued that the service was proper and that the counter petition made by the respondent was an acknowledgement of the decision as to the service of the petition. On behalf of the respondent an application was made to have the commencement of the trial postponed as the Dominion Parliament is in session and the respondent's presence was necessary at the trial. The Court extended the time of commencement till Tuesday Sept. 5 next, pending the decision of the point.
