OTTAWA, Feb. 17 (CP)—Six hundred guests were received Thursday last by Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir at the first of their two receptions held each year in Rideau Hall.

The guest list included Prime Minister Mackenzie King, members of the Diplomatic Corps, the Cabinet Ministers, the High Commissioner in Canada for the United Kingdom, Judges of the Supreme Court and Exchequer Court, members of the Senate and Commons, officers and officials of His Majesty's defence forces and civil servants.
