**AT ROTARY**  
At the Rotary luncheon yesterday there was an "All Rotary" program with Dr. Johnson in the chair. The chairman spoke of the need of members coming in sharp on time, and also said it was advisable that there should be no conversation while vocalists and other performers were entertaining the Club. The main address was given by Past District Governor George Inman, who dwelt on the need of more systematic functioning by the various committees. He thought that fines should be imposed early in the meeting rather than at the close. Livestock Report

**MONTREAL, Nov. 22**—Cattle receipts 1,601. 6.75 was offered for the best load of steers and 5.00 for a load of top cows. The bulk of the cattle were of common to just medium quality and were practically all sold under 6.00. Sellers were asking more money and although buyers were slow to change, prices were estimated to be 25 cents higher. Quotations:—Butcher steers—good 6.25 to 6.75; medium 5.50 to 6.00; common 4.25 to 5.50; butcher fanners—good 5.50 to 5.75; medium 4.75 to 5.25; common 3.25 to 4.50; butchers cows—good 4.75 to 5.00; medium 3.00 to 4.25; canners 1.75 to 2.00; cutters 2.25 to 2.75; butchers sows—common 3.25 to 3.75; calf receipts 1,200. There was no choice real calves and prices on the medium kinds appeared a shade easier, the top for good veal picked out today was 11.00 and the balance of the suckers calves were sold from 8.50 to 10.50. Grassers sold from 3.50 to 4.00; bulk of sales 3.50. Quotations:—Good veal \$10.50 to \$11.00, medium \$8.50 to \$10.00, common \$5.00 to \$7.00, grassers \$3.50 to \$4.00, sheep receipts 3,344. The bulk of the lambs on sale today were of 'ambos brought \$11.00 with one or two small lots of black faced ewes at \$11.25. Common lambs sold from \$9.75 to \$10.50 and culled \$9.00. Bucks \$1.00 less and sheep were very slow at from \$3.00 to \$5.50. Quotations:—Ewes \$3.00 to \$5.50; lambs good \$11.00 to \$11.25; common \$9.75 to \$10.50; bucks \$8.75 to \$10.00. Hog receipts 1,991. Hog prices were somewhat irregular. Receipts were lighter and packers were offering \$11.00 for thick smooths with a \$2.00 premium per hog in selects and \$10.50 for shops. Local butchers paid \$11.25 for the thick smooth and shops and \$2.00 per hog for selects and in a very few cases paid \$11.50 on a flat basis. Sows were from \$9.00 to \$9.25.

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THE MARKETS

**MONTREAL, Nov. 22**—The export trade in Canadian grain in the Montreal market today was again very quiet, there being practically no demand from foreign buyers. A fair amount of business was done in coarse grain. The market for Canadian western grades of oats was firm. The feature of the flour trade was the stronger feeling that developed in the market for spring wheat grades and prices were advanced twenty cents per barrel. First patents were quoted at \$8.00 second patents \$7.60, strong bakers \$7.30 per barrel. Business was quiet even at the lower levels. Prices for winter wheat grades of flour were firmly maintained under a good demand. The millfeed market continued moderately active and values were firm. A fairly active business was transacted in standard grades of rolled oats and prices were steady. The domestic and export trade in cheese continued inactive but values were steady. Western grades were quoted at 17 1/2 cents to 17 3/4 cents per pound, and eastern quality at 17 cents to 17 1/2 cents per pound. The receipt was 2,791 boxes. The butter market was quiet but firm. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 35 1/2 to 36 cents per pound. A stronger feeling developed in the market for fresh extra grades and prices were marked up two to five cents per dozen. The demand was fair. The market for storage eggs was active and steady. Fresh extras were quoted at 62 cents to 65 cents per dozen. The receipts were 900 cases. There was a fair demand for beans and values were firm. Car lots of choice white handpicked were offered at \$2.75 per bag, and smaller quantities at \$3.00 per bushel. A moderate amount of business was done in potatoes and values were unchanged. Sales of Prince Edward Island green mountains were made at \$1.80 per bag. New Brunswick green mountains at \$1.70 per bag, the Quebec white stock at \$1.55 to \$1.60 per bag of 90 lbs.

**OTTAWA—(Eggs)**—Canadian egg markets continue firm and advancing under lighter receipts. A car of fresh left Vancouver on November 19th for the east.  
Toronto—Fresh eggs are extremely scarce with storage eggs moving freely. The market is unchanged from last week-end with dealers paying for ungraded eggs delivered extra 60, firsts 50, seconds 32. Prices to retailers of fresh are extra 70, firsts 48, seconds 38 to 39, storage extras 56, firsts 43, seconds 38.

**Montreal**—Practically no local ungraded fresh are arriving. Dealers are quoting from this class of stock extra 57 to 59, firsts 45 to 46, seconds 33 to 35, prices to retailers of fresh are extra 60 to 2/7, firsts 45 to 52, seconds 40, storage extra 45 to 50, firsts 37, seconds 35 to 37, poultry prices are unchanged from last week and stock is arriving freely.

**Winnipeg**—Paying prices to country shippers have advanced under continued light receipts. Dealers are now quoting extra 50 to 55, firsts 45 to 50, seconds 25. Prices of fresh to retailers are pullet extra 60, firsts 55, seconds 33. Storage extra 43, firsts 10, seconds 35. Poultry receipts are few with the only price change being for dressed chicken over five pounds, for this class dealers are paying 28 cents.

**Saskatchewan**—The market is steady with dealers quoting country shippers extra 43 to 45, firsts 40, seconds 30. Prices of storage to retailers are extra 42 to 45, firsts 10, seconds 34 to 37.

**Poultry**—Receipts are heavy. Quotations on turkeys at Saskatoon are for young toms and hens over eleven pounds, 20; nine to eleven pounds 19; seven to one pounds 14; old toms 13; old hens 15; number two stock 12. Paying prices for dressed turkeys are 8 cents above live quotations.

**Edmonton**—The egg market is very firm with the price of fresh to consumers extra 75, firsts 70, seconds 60; storage eggs are selling to retailers at extra 45, firsts 40, seconds 32.

**Poultry**—The market is steady with receipts fairly heavy. Dealers are paying for live chickens 12 to 14, fowl 9 to 11, ducks 13, geese 12. Calgary—This market is relying on British Columbia entirely for its fresh eggs. Storage firsts are selling to retailers at 42, seconds 38.

**Poultry**—The movement is light with dealers paying for chickens 14 to 16, fowl 10, roosters 6.

**Vancouver**—Prices are unchanged but the market is very firm and wholesale floors are well cleaned in "Que Vadit" is also good. **THE THEATRES YESTERDAY**  
Large Audiences View Excellent Programs at Prince Edward and Strand.

The G. B. Samuelson special production which opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre, met with spontaneous and unqualified success. Not every day does one see a film play of such big pretensions which at the same time is knitted into a coherent dramatic story which carries the anxieties and sympathies of an audience from beginning to conclusion. It is doubtful whether we have ever seen as fine a sequence of battle engagements as were presented in this picture.
