CONSECRATION.—In the cathedral at the different masses yesterday the arrangements for the consecration of Bishop LeBlanc on Tuesday morning were announced. The ceremonies will begin at ten o'clock, the consecrating bishop being His Excellency Monsignor Stagni, of Ottawa, who will have as assistant consecrators, Most Rev. Archbishop McCarthy, of Halifax, and most Rev. Paul Bruchesi of Montreal. Other church dignitaries from all parts of Canada will be present, as well as the clergy from the surrounding dioceses. Rt. A reception will be tendered him in the cathedral immediately after his arrival, and addresses will be presented on behalf of the clergy and laity. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of a valuable Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency, or certain commissions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. The homesteader must reside upon and cultivate the land in each of three years. The homesteader may by written agreement, in duplicate, to a third party, or to his father, mother, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the home stead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carry homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres there. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption, may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
