For the information of our readers who may have missed the vital point brought out we repeat what the Star had to say: "The leaders in the world of in luxury and finance, the men who have made money, know better than anyone in what perilous plight Canada is today."

"By right of wealth, by right of the stake they have in the country by the influence they command these men should be foremost in leadership in all works for the general welfare, foremost in seeing that good government prevail, foremost in that conservatism, the counter-balance the ephemeral fashions of the hour, foremost in holding politicians to their duty."

"Instead of assuming these responsibilities, many of them shirk them, fearing that their possessions may be imperilled if they stand the poorest office holder or head on the susceptibilities of the smallest and most selfish politician. These are the real stackers, they see the enemy behind their bushes; they know his strength they appreciate the awful meaning of defeat, and yet they refuse to serve. The one thing that scares them is talk of conscription or war."

"Two words make them shiver: 'Capital Levy.'"

Unfortunately, the Star is only too correct for one can list a very small band of our wealthy men, who by their pens or financial support, are doing any real constructive work for our country.

Unfortunately, the attitude of these "Stackers" is often reflected in the attitude of their under studies, the men who will sit in the saddle a few years hence.

At heart, the majority of men in the leading places of the financial and industrial work of Canada would respond to any effort where by their constructive assistance would be of great benefit to Canada. What we want is a rude awakening to our responsibilities of citizenship.
