QUICK START ON REDS HEADED OFF STRIKE

W. MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 11.—Havelock Wilson, M. P., president British Seamen's Union, gave out the following announcement to your representative today: "My information regarding a Red plot is now amply confirmed. They have been manoeuvring this scheme for nearly eighteen months. They announced from their headquarters in Chicago that a world strike of seamen was to take place in March last. The opportunity was not favorable, and speedy settlement with regard to the wages nullified the Reds." This shows the advantage of coming to an understanding quickly. It gives the Reds no opportunity to agitate, and the new wage scale was in operation three weeks before they got a start. The outbreak commenced in Australia was due, of course, to the influence of Walsh and Johnson. Over 60,000 men had already accepted the new agreement before the agitation started. That is why the Reds are so furious.

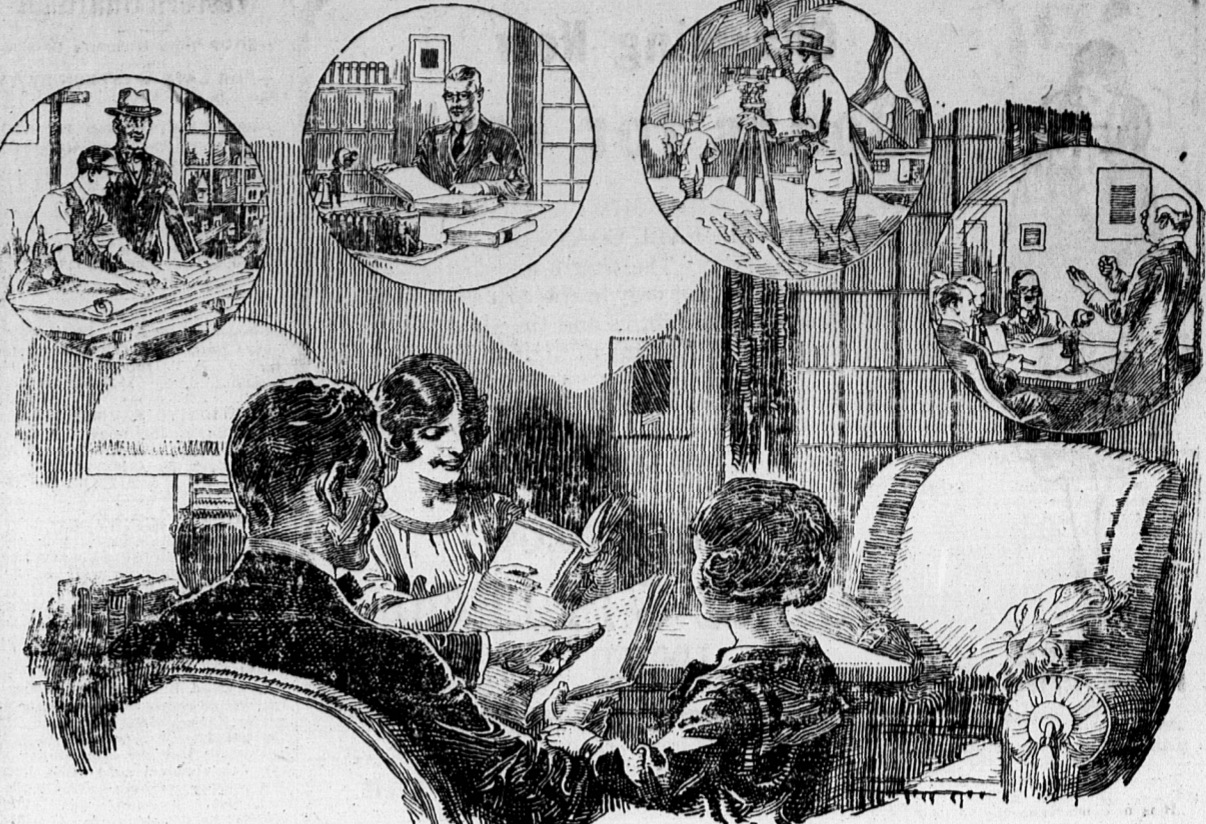
