BEARS REGAIN LEAD FROM TORONTO LEAFS

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, May 16—Newark Bears regained the leadership of the International League today from Toronto Maple Leafs when they salvaged one victory from their three-game series with Montreal Royals. Newark defeated Royals 6-14 in 10 innings, concluding the brief series here.

The winning run was driven in by Nolan Richardson with a single to right field and Chad Kinsey, relief Montreal hurler, walked home an extra tally in the 10th. An innings before Newark had rallied to tie the score, Roy singling, stealing second and scoring on Dick Foran's single.

Toronto's leadership lasted just one day. They toppled from the top rung when they tossed away the final game of the series with Baltimore 5-4.

Sheriff Blake held the Leafs to five scattered hits until the ninth when the Leafs drove him from the mound with a four-hit barrage. They had scored two runs and the bases were loaded when Harry Gumbert was called to the rescue. He retired Jimmy Shevlin to end the game.

The Leafs contributed three errors in the first inning to pave the way for two Baltimore runs and catcher Johnny Peacock dropped the ball when he had Spencer Trapp ped at the plate in the ninth with what proved to be the winning run.

Indians Feet Interest Art

(By The Canadian Press) CALGARY, May 16—Canada's wealthiest Indians, the Blackfeet, of Glacier, Alta., will feel most acutely the recent order of the Department of Indian Affairs at Ottawa curtailing interest from various rates of six and seven percent to five percent. The department holds approximately \$2,000,000 belonging to this tribe, resulting largely from the sale of reserve lands.

The new rate was made retroactive to Jan. 1, 1935. Where formerly payments were made due on the anniversary of the sale these dates, in future, will come in October. More than 240,000 acres of reserve lands were disposed of, 125,000 acres were sold between 1900 and 1910. There are 700 Indians left on the reserve.

Ruth Denies Rumor Re Retirement

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. LOUIS, May 16—Babe Ruth, the one-time "Sultan of Swat", tonight made emphatic denial that he intends terminating his baseball playing career at the end of the current road trip of Boston Braves.

The 41 year old veteran, reported in New York to have declared "I'm all washed up," appeared angered at circulation of word of his "retirement."

"I'm going to play here tomorrow and keep right on playing as long as I have anything left," he asserted. "There's not a word of truth in the New York story. I have a cold, but am feeling better and am in good shape."

Ruth's denial of the oft-repeated rumor he would quit the playing field, preferably in favor of a big league managerial job, was not unexpected. The general impression in baseball circles is he is greatly disappointed at his inability to field and hit like he once did.

They were red-hot themselves, though, as the young lefty, Vito Tamulis, held the second place Cleveland Indians helpless while the rest of the Yanks belted them around 10-0.

Willis Hudlin, Thorn Lee, Clint Brown all looked alike to the Yankee club boys who've been struggling for base hits ever since the season started. Bill Dickey led the way with four, two of them doubles, another a triple, in the 15-hit assault. Ben Chapman got a homer and a double, Tony Lazzeri, Myril Hoag, and Earl Combs got a couple of hits each, as the Yanks began to look themselves once more.

It was young Tamulis' third straight victory against no defeats, second time in a row he's beaten the Indians. He allowed seven hits, fanned four and gave no bases on balls.

Dodgers Defeat Pirates In 13 Inning Struggle

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PITTSBURGH, May 16—Tom Zachary, the canny Brooklyn left hander, got the better of Waite Hoyt in an overtime mound duel between a pair of veterans today and the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers emerged with a 13-inning 2-0 triumph over Pittsburgh Pirates.

The two old timers, both of whom once pitched for New York Yankees, put on a great display of elbowing over the long route. The Pirates had a 129 edge in the hitting but after weathering trouble in the first inning, Zachary didn't allow the Bucs to put together two hits in one inning until the 12th. His deceptive slants had the Pirate plasters, who slammed out 20 runs against the Phillies yesterday, lunging and growling without effect all afternoon.

Hoyt was even better until an error by Arky Vaughan started the Stengel clan off on its winning rally in the 13th. With one down in that inning, the shortstop fumbled. Freney Bordagary's grounder, Linus (Junior) Frey sent him along to second with a single and Jim Bucher, substituting at second base, connected for another base hit to break the scoreless deadlock.

Bucher went on to second on the throw to third then Tony Cucinello was passed to cram the corners. Danny Taylor finished the rally by hoisting a fly to Paul Waner and Frey scored after the catch.

SARAZEN FAVORITE TO REGAIN TITLE

(Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, May 16—To the surprise of nobody, stocky Gene Sarazen, the "double eagle kid," is a prime favorite in the future books to regain the United States Open Golf Championship this June at Oakmont.

Sarazen is "six, three, two and even" according to press posted today by Jack Doyle, veteran Broadway commissioner and a close follower of the golfing ways since Francis Oumlet took Ted Ray and Harry Vardon at Brookline 22 years ago.

In other words a dollar will get you six, if you think Gene will whip the big international field on a course that is quite generally regarded as the Frankenstein of American links. Not since the retirement of Bob Jones has any golfer other than Sarazen himself been paid the compliment of such a short price in an open tournament.

The defending champion, Olin Dutra is bracketed with blond Cra'g Wood, runner-up to Sarazen in the Augusta National invitation event this spring, as second choice at 8 to 1 in Doyle's book. Henry Picard, who led the winner's money with Paul Runyan, the United States P. G. A. title holder, 12 to 1, and Ky Laifoon, 15 to 1.

Ten other professionals are quoted as 20 to 1 shots in Doyle's book. Not a single amateur among some 25 who have qualified for the tournament, including Omaha's Johnny Goodman, 1933, winner, is rated better than a 50 to 1 shot.
