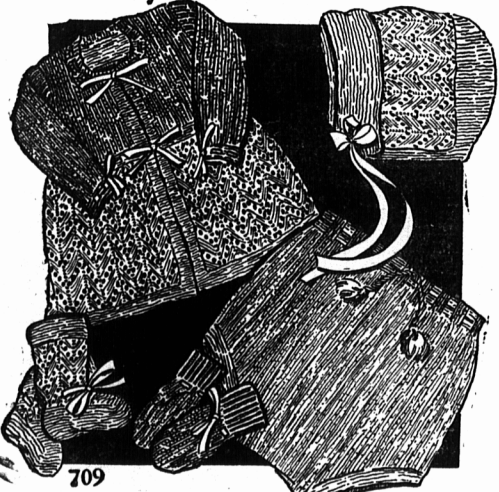

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THE COOK'S CORNER

English Fruit Cake

- 3-4 cup butter 1 cup sugar 4 eggs 1 lb. Sultana raisins 1-2 lb. mixed peel 1-4 lb. glace cherries 1 cup blanched almonds 1-2 cup homemade apple jelly 1-2 cup drained crushed pineapple 1-4 cup pineapple juice 2 1-2 cups flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1-2 teaspoon salt 1-2 teaspoon each almond and vanilla

Method: Cream the sugar with the butter, then add the well beaten eggs. If they are large eggs, 3 will be sufficient. Sift the flour with the baking powder, cinnamon and salt and add a little of this, then the well drained pineapple and the jelly which has been beaten with a fork until it is soft and smooth. Scald the raisins and then drain and dry them thoroughly. Place in a bowl with the mixed peel, 1/2 cup cherries and almonds and sift over them a little of the sifted flour. Mix well so that each piece is well coated. Add these to the first mixture with any remaining flour. Mix lightly and add the flavorings. Turn into a loaf or tube pan lined with heavy waxed or well greased brown paper and bake in a slow oven for 2 1/2 hours. The exact time depends on the size and the depth of the pan you use.

This cake is hard when it is finished, but if you wrap it well and store it in a covered jar or crock with half an apple, it ripens and softens.

If you prefer to use candied pineapple instead of the crushed, you can do so, only you may need a tiny bit more pineapple juice, or other fruit juice. And be sure that you drain the crushed pineapple very thoroughly or the batter will be too moist.

- 1. Lie on back, pull your right knee to chest and clasp hands around it, as in sketch. 2. Rock backward, swing left leg over head. 3. Rock forward to sitting position, pull from knees. Have back flat, chest forward, head high. Do three times, repeat with left knee. Rest, do 12 times in all. Simple illustrated exercises for many other figure faults are given in our 32-page booklet.
