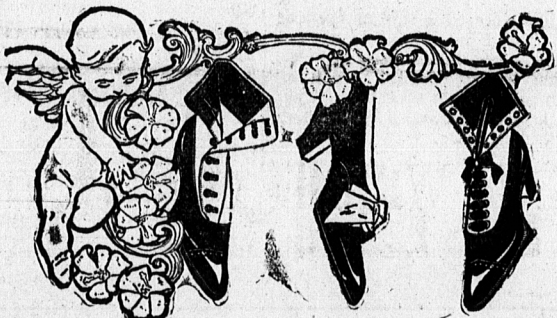

The Montreal Star reports that oysters there are very scarce and as a consequence prices have advanced. Malpeques are being sold at \$10 and \$12 per barrel and bulk oysters have been advanced 10c per gallon. A very pleasant evening was spent in the Hall, Wheatley River, on Saturday, when Miss Ruby Ratray acted as substitute for Miss Rackham, at the entertainment announced for that date. The change was made owing to the illness of Miss Rackham. Miss Margaret Martin was pianist, and Miss Laura Blinkey soloist. All numbers were excellently rendered and enjoyed by an appreciative audience. Owing to the enormous amount of time and expense necessary in bookkeeping and making out small accounts as well as mailing and collecting same, The Guardian has decided that in future all ordinary amounts under one dollar will be accepted in a cash in advance basis and ten per cent discount given, except to those who have a regular advertising account who will still have the privilege of monthly credit. The many friends of George Lewis West Royalty, will be pained to learn of his death which occurred last evening. As was noted in The Guardian some time ago the outlook for smelts on the New York Market this season promises to be good. McDonald, of North Sydney who was on Thursday committed to the Supreme Court on the charge of robbing \$3,500 and four registered letters from the post office, was taken from the lockup there on Saturday and conveyed in a covered carriage to the ferry wharf, and crossed on the steamer to Sydney, where he will remain in the county jail awaiting the next sitting of the Supreme Court. The prisoner feels his position keenly and outside of shaking hands with several friends who approached him on the boat refused to talk or exchange conversation. It is not known, what action, if any, will be taken, but it is reported there that habeas corpus proceedings are now in progress with a view to obtaining a reopening of the case on the grounds that the evidence adduced at the preliminary hearing was insufficient to connect McDonald with the robbery. Legal gentlemen there claim the putting of the prisoner on the stand as a witness for the Crown was irregular, and therefore believe the case will be reopened.
