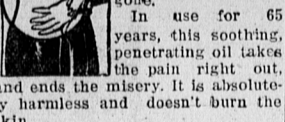

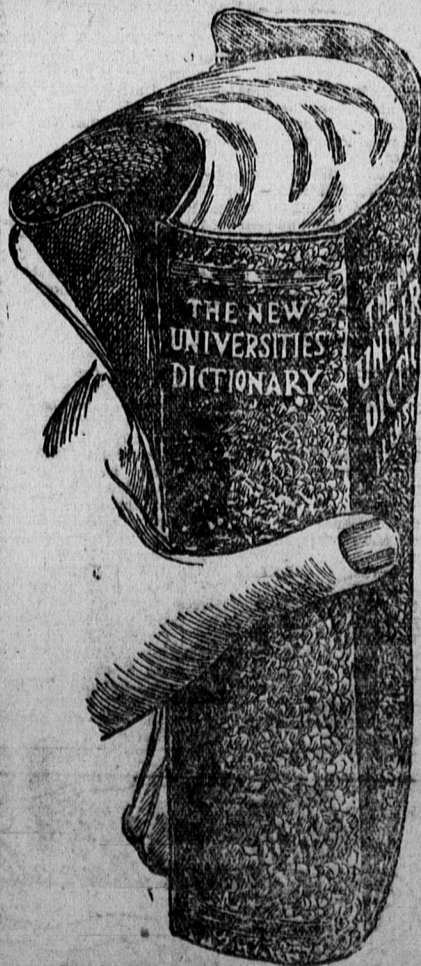

**Denies Third  
Degree Methods  
in Godwin Conf.**

ST. JOHN, N. B., March 7.—In an interview this evening, Commissioner of Public Safety John Thornton, head of the police department, denied all knowledge of third degree methods, as popularly understood, having been used in extracting from Stewart Godwin, the 16 year old Little River youth, acquitted on Wednesday of the murder of Mrs. Clara Whiteside, a confession, which incriminated him but which was disallowed as evidence by Chief Justice McKeown at the trial of Godwin. So far as he knew, Commissioner Thornton said, no third degree methods had been used, the confession being entirely voluntary on the part of the boy.
