COMPROMISE TALK IN POLITICAL CIRCLES

LONDON, July 8—Talk of compromise on the constitutional question is novapaper at the eleventh hour recognize that the king has no alternative but to create sufficient peers to carry the veto bill; if the premier so recommends, and say, therefore that the house of lords will commit political suicide if it compels the government to take that course. Hence, with a view to saving the king's face, they point to the fact that Viscount Morley, in the recent debate in the house of lords, showed a disposition to look favorably on an amendment Lord Newton proposes to move on the repeal stage of the measure, which provides that the king should have further limitation of the legislative powers of the house of lords shall be introduced until after a general election.

The Unionists are now inclined to regard an undertaking on the part of the government not to go any farther in the direction of a single chamber government as an acceptable compromise, and if Premier Asquith should decide to accept Lord Newton's amendment it is understood that the house of lords will adopt the veto bill after the house of commons has thrown out the lord's amendments.

It is reported that the Unionist leaders in this event have decided upon a policy of acceptance of the veto bill under protest, with the intention to repeal it when they return to power, and then proceed to reform the house of lords and as soon as possible introduce the referendum into the constitutional system.

CROP REQUIREMENTS AFFECT MARKET

WINNIPEG, July 7—Because of the colossal amount of money being put out by the banks in the west to handle the annual crop, other lines of business in western Canada are today hard pressed for funds. This is the cry from all sections. Collections are reported above the average by collectors, but they are complaining of tight money. All loans relating to real estate even remotely have been cut off in the west on orders from Montreal and Toronto. In view of the heavy business this is being felt severely.

BARON OF AUSTRIA ELECTED BY LIBS

LONDON, July 9—Maurice Arnold Deforest, hereditary baron of the Austrian empire, and authorized to use his title in the United Kingdom, a Liberal was elected to the house of commons today for the north division of Westham. Charles F. G. Manser, under secretary of state in the home office, who was returned also for a division in the general elections, was deprived of his seat on June tenth by the finding of court that his election was aided by corrupt practices on the part of his agents.

FEDERAL JURYMEN HEAR MRS JENKINS.

NEW YORK, July 8—Mrs Helen D. Jenkins, on whose information the government has been investigating a smuggling plot involving hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of jewelry and wearing apparel, and in which the name of Nathan Allen, of Kenosha (Wis.) has been mentioned, yesterday appeared before the federal grand jury to give testimony in the case. Mrs Jenkins was in the grand jury room for more than an hour, and when she left the room gave indications that she had been questioned at length regarding the case.

No information regarding the nature of her testimony was given out by the government officials, but it had been announced she would repeat in detail the facts regarding her trip to Europe with Mr. Allen in 1909, when, it is alleged, some of the smuggled goods were purchased. It is charged that much of the \$300,000 worth of jewelry which was stolen from Mrs Jenkins at the Hotel Lorraine in December, 1909, was smuggled, and it was believed Mrs Jenkins yesterday told what she knows about it.

Mrs Jenkins yesterday was successful in dodging the private detective who have been following her ever since the case became public. She arrived at the federal building in her automobile and was taken to the grand jury room without her presence becoming known to others than the officials concerned. After she had completed her testimony she left the building without having to dodge photographers and was taken to the apartment at 1100 Broadway and Seventy-seventh street.

Other witnesses in this case are expected to appear before the grand jury within a few days. It is possible that among these will be Mr. Allen himself and John R. Collins, of Memphis (Tenn.), who was in Europe with Mr. Allen and Mrs. Jenkins.

KINEO, Me., July 9—Five hundred men are engaged tonight in fighting one of the worst forest fires that Maine has ever known. It has already burned over an area seven miles long in Enchanted townships. Men are being drafted from other townships by the authorities to assist in the work. In the French town district a fire has been burning for several days in spite of the efforts of three hundred men to control it. Still another serious fire is burning on Lobster Mountain.
