BELIEVE LEADER OF SPITZBERGEN EXPLORERS DEAD.

—CHRISTIANIA, Norway, April 9.—Four members of the Schroeder-Stranz Spitzbergen expedition reached Advent Bay today, after a winter of almost unbelievable suffering in the solitudes of Spitzbergen, where they were icebound.

The explorers reported that two other members of the party are resting at Treurenberg Bay; that an aviator and the cook of the expedition are dead, and that Lieutenant Schroeder-Stranz, leader of the party, is missing and is believed dead.

CUDAHY AGAINST KILLING OF CALVES.

MILWAUKEE, April 9.—"A law prohibiting the slaughter of calves for veal and allowing beef and live stock to come into this country duty free would be two great steps toward solving the problem of the high price of beef," said Patrick Cudahy, the packer. "The people can get along easily without veal, but not without beef. Veal may be looked on as a luxury and beef as a necessity."

FOUR ON TRIAL FOR WESTPORT WRECK.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., April 9.—Before Judge Gardner Greene and a jury in the Criminal Court, today, four officials of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad were placed on trial, charged with criminal negligence and manslaughter in connection with the Westport wreck when seven people were killed. These officials are Henry J. Horn, former vice-president; B. R. Pollock, former general superintendent; C. N. Woodward, present general superintendent, and Lawrence J. Curmat, maintenance engineer.

PRINCE ADELBERT TO MARRY OLGA.

BERLIN, April 9.—The house of Hohenzollern and Cumberland have been cemented by another imperial troth, according to a telegram received here today from Hamburg. This telegram announced that Prince Adelbert, the third son of Emperor William, has become engaged to Princess Olga, a sister of Prince Ernst of Cumberland, whose engagement to Princess Louise, only daughter of the Kaiser, was recently announced. Princess Louise and Prince Ernst will be married May 24, according to present plans.
