Whereas the use of wooden shingles as roof covering has been responsible for a large number of fires throughout the Maritime Provinces and...

Whereas fire retardant roof coverings have been developed that may be readily purchased at a reasonable price and easily applied...

And be it further resolved that the Maritime Fire Chiefs' Association assembled in convention at Charlottetown, P. E. I., on July 13, 1937, call upon all authorities having jurisdiction in Nova Scotia, and Island to take legislative action condemning the wooden shingle as a roof covering on new buildings and on replacements on existing buildings so that in some of time this hazard may be eliminated without hardship on property owners.

Board Prepares For Visitation Of Mr. Dunning

Anticipating a visit here shortly from Hon. C. A. Dunning, Dominion Finance Minister and federal representative for the County, plans for the presentation of briefs on harbour improvement, airports, transportation and other matters were discussed last night at the quarterly meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

The plan of the latter boxes has been changed to run north and south.

A letter was read from the Charlottetown branch of the Canadian Legion, requesting cooperation of the Trade Board and other organizations in a campaign to reorganize the Legion Band. A sum of \$3,000 is required for instruments, etc. On motion of Mr. R. E. Mutch, a committee consisting of the President, Vice-president and secretary was appointed to discuss the matter with a committee of the Legion.

A memorandum from Mr. Rand Matheson, manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission, was read relative to the Commission's application to the Railways for free pick-up and delivery service in the Maritimes. It was referred to the transportation committee.

Another communication from Mr. Matheson contained a brief submitted to the Ontario Highways Minister on rate control for motor vehicles in that province.

Several letters from the Canadian Chamber of Commerce were read and discussed. Including a memo relative to proposed amendments to the bankruptcy laws of the Dominion, which was referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. Bell, Tweedy and Fisher.

Another communication from the Canadian Chamber of Commerce announced that the closing date of the Association for the care of children, sponsored by the Chamber, had been deferred until Nov. 30.

Mr. Mutch reported interviewing Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works, on the subject of improved roads to the Upton Airport and the Experimental Farm. Assurance was received that the roads would be improved, although no paving work would be undertaken this year.

Questioned with regard to auto traffic on the Car Ferry steamer, Mr. P. W. Clarkin said the traffic so far this summer was less than last year.

After some further routine business, the meeting adjourned.
