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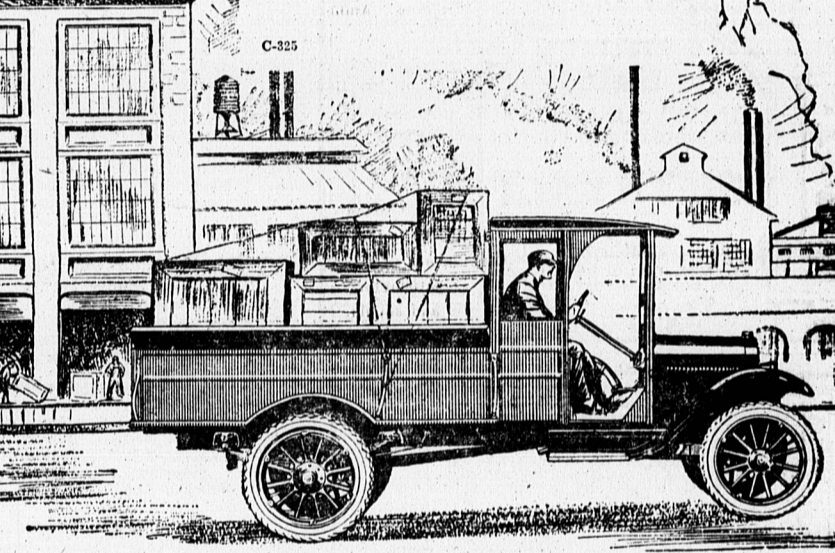

RUSSIAN PRINCESS IS A SHOPLIFTER
PARIS, Aug. 27.—Princess Eugenie Gallitzine, aged 60, wife of Prince Nicholas Gallitzine of Russia, has been sentenced by default to two months' imprisonment and a fine of twenty francs for stealing from a department store when she was caught in the act, according to evidence given in the correctional court.
When arrested the princess admitted she had taken pieces of silk from various stores intending to make them into articles for sale. She pleaded that she was destitute, no occasional allowance from the Russian Red Cross being all that stood between her and starvation.
Because of the state of her health she was not held pending trial, but she failed to answer when her case was called in the trial court and it is learned that she is now in Switzerland.

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
