The great augmentation of shipbuilding activity in the merchant marine means that British shipping is carrying freight all over the Seven Seas. The British Mercantile Marine remains in the van. It is a good sign for Britain and the Empire.

-GRAND RIVER.-The annual meeting of the Grand River Dairy Company was held at the Maple Leaf Hall on Tuesday, Jan. 20th with a large attendance of patrons. The Vice President, Mr. Frank Gillis occupied the chair and on opening the meeting expressed regret at the absence of the President, Mr. Henry Thompson, who resigned from the Board of Directors on account of illness. Mr. Thompson performed the duties of President to the entire satisfaction of the Company. The Secretary in his report showed that 82,345 pounds milk was received during the season, an increase over last year of 59,142 pounds. The receipts for the season was \$12,961.20 a decrease from the previous year of \$2,701.44. The average percent of fat in milk 3.56, value of fat per pound 29.28 cents; average price received for milk \$1.04; 100 pounds milk to 1 pound cheese 10.8; average price received for cheese 15; 18 cents per pound, new milk. A vat was installed last season to handle the increased supply of milk and the prospects for the coming season are favorable. A discussion followed re the employment of a dairy inspector and the buying of supplies and the selling of the products and after a general expression of opinions it was decided that the delegates to the Dairy Association meeting use their best judgment on the questions. The delegates are Messrs. Frank Gillis and Ed. Larkins. The patrons receiving the largest amounts are Frank Gillis, \$418.50; P. A. McLellan, \$275.57; Venandina Morrison, \$250.55; John Adams, \$239.86; Gordon McArthur \$232.98; and A. Connell, \$221.88. The following are the directors: Frank Gillis, Joseph R. McIntyre, C. C. Doble, Artemus McArthur, James McIntyre, Fred McDonald and Marshall McLellan.

Red Cross Activities In City Schools

Since the Red Cross Public Health Nurses commenced their winter work in Charlottetown a health inspection has been carried on in both the Model School and Rochford Square School. These inspections have been the second ones made in the two schools since the Red Cross health work has first started in the province. The doctors have been most kind in giving their time and services to the work. The doctors examining the throats and the physicians making the physical examinations, in the Model School 99 children were examined, 79 of whom were also examined by the doctors. Of the 312 pupils examined in Rochford Square School 176 were gone over by the doctors. Many of the children who had previously had a medical examination during the first inspection of the school were not referred again to the doctors but were examined only by the nurses. Quite a number of defects found during the first inspections have been corrected and there has been a marked improvement in the health habits of the children. The Red Cross has been instrumental in having some of the tonsil and adenoid defects corrected by making arrangements with the doctors and hospitals for the
