### Didn't Want to Stay Out So Umpire Calls Game; Fans Near Riot

SYRACUSE, N. Y., June 16. — Haynes called the game after he had allowed Rochester to take its turn at bat and tie the score in the first half of the ninth, played in a drenching rain. The storm stopped suddenly while Syracuse was at bat in the ninth and the sky was clear and the grounds in good condition when the game was called.

President Gillis and Manager Shoton of the Stars hurried across the field to ask Hayes why he called the game and they, with the assistance of police, escorted the umpire to the club house safely. The crowd however, milled about the clubhouse with the police on duty at their post unable to check them. A patrol wagon load of reporters rushed to the park and broke up the demonstration and transported the umpire downtown.

Harry Hartz was second, two laps behind the leader, and far ahead of Tony Gulatto, who was third. De Paolo's time was 1:42, 56 8/10 an average speed of 115.57 miles an hour. By virtue of his victory De Paolo won \$7,000 as first prize money. Hartz won \$3,500 for second place and Gulatto won \$2,000. Others to finish were Eddie Herne, fourth; Babe Stapp, fifth; Cliff Woodbury, sixth; Al Melcher, seventh; Leon Duray, eighth, and Dave Evans, ninth. These were all that finished of a field of sixteen. Drivers Lucky Frank Elliott figured in the most spectacular accident of the day when he lost control of his car while rounding a curve. Ralph Heppburn, who was close behind, could not avert a collision and the rear wheel of Heppburn's car was torn off. Earl Devore's machine was struck by Heppburn's and forced from the track. Heppburn crashed into a pit. He was uninjured, but a pit mechanic was slightly hurt.

### Dempsey's Drive To Title Fight Stars July 21

NEW YORK, June 16. — Jack Dempsey's drive to do what no other heavyweight champion ever did — win back a title once lost, is to begin July 21st in a battle with Jack Sharkey, at the Yankee Stadium here. Sharkey is sure he can lick Dempsey or Gene Tunney himself for that matter. The winner of this fray is to have the coveted chance to meet the champion for the title. The "fighting Marine" has started light training for preparation for its defence in September. Dempsey will come east at once and take over his old training quarters at Saratoga, New York. He is one of the youngest ex-champions ever to attempt a comeback. He will be 32 June 24th. His opponent, Sharkey, 25, and in the pink of his fighting prime.

### Jim Johnson Heads Field In Open Tourney

OAKMONT, Pa., June 16. — Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnson, a stock young blonde young amateur from Minneapolis, pulled himself back from the brink of disaster today with a dazzling streak of shot-making that put him out in front alone when the smoke had cleared from the first half of the American open golf championship battle. All but counted out when he skidded four strokes over par and took 41 for the first nine, Johnson staged a startling comeback. Deserved by the gallery that considered his chances fast fading, "Jimmy" rallied to blaze his way home in 33, two under par for a 74. Tacked to the 73 that tied him for the first day's lead, it gave Johnson a two-day 36 hole total of 147 to top as great a field of stars as ever sought the title. It was sufficient to keep him a stroke ahead of his nearest rival, sturdy Gene Sarazen, the champion of 1922, and increase to six strokes his lead over the defending champion and Atlanta amateur ace, Bobby Jones. Right behind Sarazen, with 149, is Tom Armour, in third place as a result of the best round of the tournament so far a flashy 71 that broke the back of Oakmont's "old par" for the first time of two days of embattled stroking.
