HOME NURSE

Do you know how to put a bandage on an injured toe so it will stay there? asks Mary Beard, director, Nursing Service, American Red Cross. It is well for the home nurse to prepare herself to meet such emergencies.

After injury to a bare foot in which the skin is broken should be washed off under running water dried with sterile cotton or gauze and treated with an antiseptic such as iodine or mercurochrome, or whatever your doctor prefers that you use. After the antiseptic has dried, cover the injury with a small piece of sterile gauze and apply the bandage. For a toe injury, use a bandage about one inch or an inch and a half wide. Hold the rolled bandage in the palm of your hand and unroll it as you need it.

Correct Procedure

Place the end of the bandage at the base of the toe and hold it there while you pass the bandage back and forth over the end of the toe two or three times, holding it firm at the base above and below with thumb and finger. After the end has been covered, begin wrapping the bandage around the toe from the base toward the end. Overlap the edges each time. The bandage goes around, to hold it secure, give better protection. Wrap to the end of the toe, folding in the edges of the lengthwise bandage and covering the toe completely. Then wrap back to the base. Cut the bandage leaving an end of about four or five inches. Split the bandage down the middle and make a single knot between the two ends. Separate them and bring them around the base of the toe and tie them, with the knot on top of the toe, so that it will not be uncomfortable to step on.
