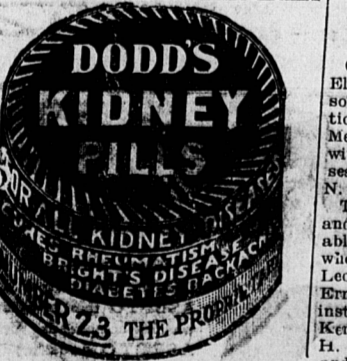

### ENJOYABLE TRIP TO TATAMAGOUCHE

About nine thirty yesterday morning the steamer Harland left for Tatamagouche. The party was by no means a large one but included some of the most prominent citizens of Charlottetown. Among the passengers were His Honor Lieutenant Governor McKinnon, Sir Louis Davis, A. B. Warburton, M. P., L. E. Frowse, M. P., James Paton and L. B. Miller. The weather was ideal and after reaching and cruising round Tatamagouche Bay for some time the wharf was reached and a stop made. From a picturesque standpoint the scene which met the visitor's eye was ideal.

In front could be seen a chain of hills forming part of the Cobequid Range.

Scattered at the foot were villages and solitary farmhouses, and then about a mile from the boat in a beautiful valley was the village of Tatamagouche.

During the return trip F. W. Hyndman in a short but practical address stated that the object of this trip had been to allow those interested to see things for themselves. The advantage of this route, in his opinion, could not be questioned, much time would be saved, and the cost of steamer service would be cheaper than it now is. As an aid to make his remarks clear a chart was used, and much appreciated.

Hon. A. B. Warburton, James Paton and other gentlemen also spoke in favor of the route, after which the informed though interesting meeting adjourned.

The city was reached about eight thirty and the passengers dispersed.

The services conducted by Rev. J. B. Ganong on Sabbath July 18th in Belfast, Orwell and Vernon River, were largely attended and were of much interest and inspiration.

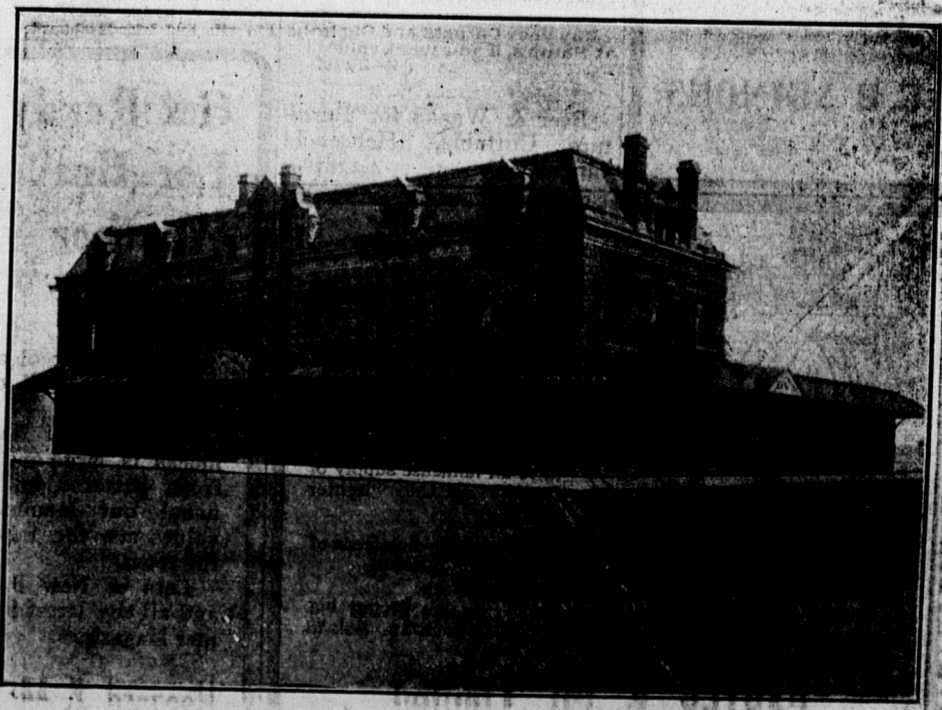
