MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 30.—There were 146 cattle, 66 calves, 260 hogs and 139 sheep and lambs for sale on the two markets. Cattle offered were common cows and bulls; prices were unchanged. Calves were mostly all yearlings and were sold for \$13.00; lambs were unchanged at \$10.00 to \$10.50 for good ewes and wethers. The bulk of the hogs were sold on a graded basis at \$11.25 for hams with \$1.00 premium per hog on selects and cuts of 50 cents on butchers \$1.00, \$2.00, \$3.00 on light and feeders, hogs and extra heavies respectively. Sows were from \$9.50 to \$10.00.

MR. NELSON RAMSAY

of acres of land now liable to flooding available for agricultural or industrial developments.

The huge sluice-gates which admit the river to the head-race canal were opened by President Cosgrave on July 22nd in the presence of 500 distinguished guests. The filling of the canal for the first time must be done with great care, the embankments being watched carefully the whole time in case constructional defects manifest themselves, and the water is not being allowed to rise in the canal by more than three inches a day. This means that the final testing of the turbines and generators cannot take place until about the middle of September. Should the final tests be satisfactory—and there is no reason to fear otherwise—distribution of electricity throughout the Irish Free State can be started in the early winter.

Concluding his speech at the opening ceremony, President Cosgrave said: "This scheme lays a firm foundation for confidence both at home and abroad in our capacity to realize those economic developments of wide national scope and efficiency to which we look forward. It is certain that even so great a plant as this will in a comparatively few years prove insufficient for our needs, and that other developments to increase our power will have to be undertaken."

To that the only comment possible is: "Bravo, Ireland!"



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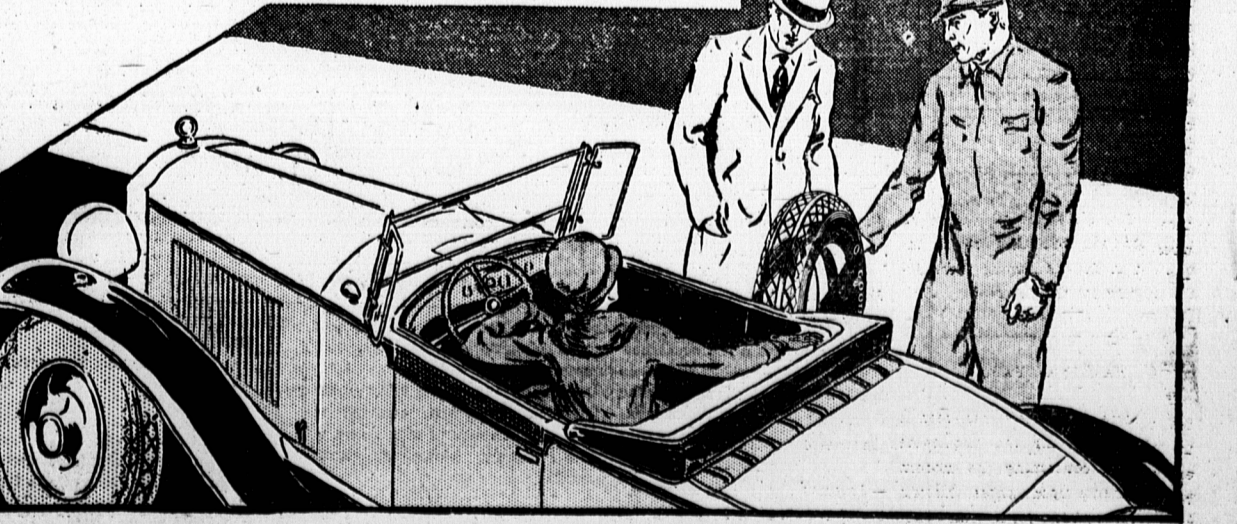
