Score Three Times In Third Period To Whip New York 5-3

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—(CP)—Boston Bruins tonight smashed the National Hockey League's undefeated record by defeating New York Rangers 5-3 in the 20th straight game in which Art Ross' great squad has either won or drawn.

An excited crowd of 15,312 packing Madison Square Garden to the roof saw Boston break up a closely contested game with three goals in the third period to wipe out the record of 19 straight, hung up by the Rangers in the 1936-37 season and led by Boston last Tuesday.

On the strength of their play tonight the Bruins, now comfortably installed in first place with a three-point lead over Toronto Maple Leafs, looked good enough to carry the record still farther. Their next game is at Montreal Saturday when they will try for their 25th.

The record of the Bruins, called by Ross the greatest team he has had, is 13 victories and seven ties. The streak began at Detroit last December 22 with a 6-3 victory. The Rangers a year ago, on the way to the Stanley Cup victory, had 14 victories, five draws.

Stormy weather Wins race

NASSAU, Bahamas, Feb. 13.—(AP)—The veteran yacht Stormy Weather, queen of the Miami-to-Nassau racing fleet, today extended her reign to five years by winning the eighth annual 184-mile dash across the Gulf Stream.

Funny Weather sailed into the harbor at 1:23 a.m. with 13 minutes to spare in corrected time. She was third across the finish line.

Escapade was the first to finish, but because of her greater length and sail area had to give away two hours, 11 minutes, 26 seconds to Stormy Weather. The fleet bucked choppy seas and rain squalls for two-thirds of the route. Escapade required 36 hours, 25 minutes, eight seconds for the voyage.

Stormy Weather finished in 37 hours, 23 minutes, 36 seconds. Her corrected time was 35:12:06, putting her comfortably inside of both Escapade and Good News.

Good News' elapsed time was 36:20:58, her corrected time 35:32:49.

U. S. seeks to Induce citizens To leave for East

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—(CP)—The United States government sought anew today to induce Americans to leave the Far East as Australian officials at Sydney declared that "the war has moved into a new stage involving the utmost gravity."

In the foreign diplomatic corps here, there were two interpretations of the Australian statement. Some said they saw signs that Japan might strike south toward Singapore. Britain's great naval base in the Pacific, or toward the Netherlands East Indies. Others felt that the statement might be intended primarily to stir the Australians to even greater war efforts.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull said he had no late advice to explain the concern felt in Australia.

In other diplomatic quarters, however, the belief was expressed that the Australian statement was based on late information indicating that Japan might be planning a move soon in the South Pacific.

How imminent any such thrust might be was uncertain here, but speculation centred largely on the possibility that Japan might act almost simultaneously with new thrusts in Europe by the Axis powers.
