WASHINGTON, April 24.—The democratic tariff bill, putting agricultural implements, cotton bagging, leather boots and shoes, harness, meat, lumber, flour and many other articles on the free list of the existing tariff laws of the United States came before the house in the last few moments before adjournment today, and will be taken up again as soon as the house convenes tomorrow.

A final vote on the bill will not be reached before the end of this week, and house leaders are in doubt whether it will come before the following week. Chairman Underwood, of the ways and means committee, expressed the opinion in the house this afternoon, that the debate will last four or five days and republican leaders state that it will taken even longer.

The democrats are confident of passing the "farmers free list," as it is known by a large majority. The indications are that the bill will have a number of republican votes in its support, including a substantial proportion of the insurgent republican strength.

**FIRE IN HOLD OF STEAMER EXTINGUISHED**

QUEENSTOWN, April 24.—The fire in the hold of the British steamer Mobile, which put in here Saturday has been extinguished. The Mobile will discharge her cargo and will be docked for repairs. The Mobile sailed from Antwerp for Baltimore on April 14. When 600 miles westward of the Irish coast fire was discovered in the forehold, and the Mobile was turned back for this port.
