THE NICARAGUA CANAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—(Special)—The Senate Committee on Canals has unanimously reported bills for the construction of the Nicaragua Canal.

A COLORED MEN'S PETITION.

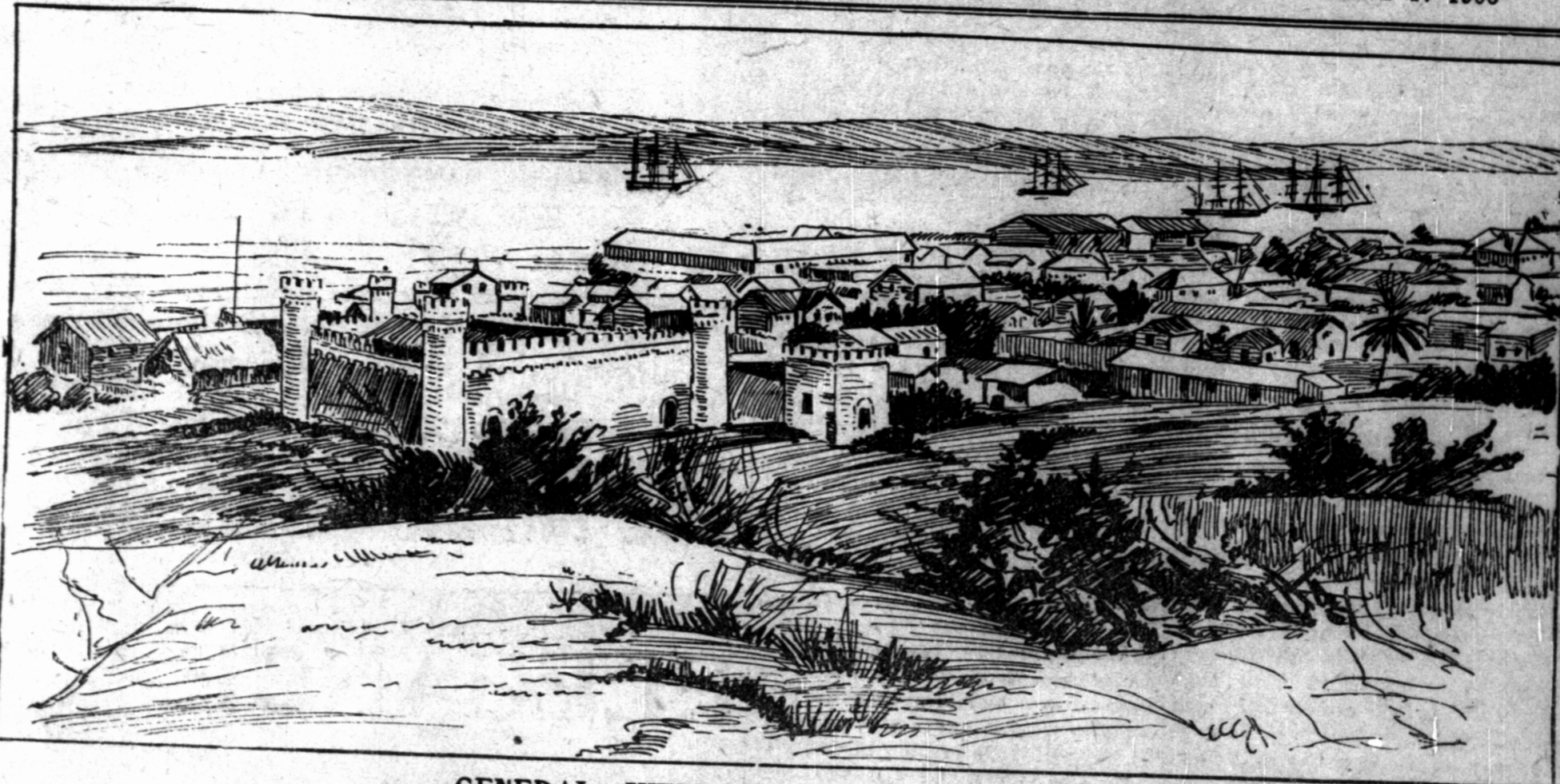

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT

Untimely Death of Arch'd. J. Campbell, at Ipswich, Mass., While Skating.

Ipswich people were much stirred up, Thursday afternoon, Dec. 28th, when they learned of the untimely death of Archie, the little 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Campbell, of Suttonsall Street.

The little fellow, together with three more of his playmates were skating upon the river. After a short skate across the glassy ice near the landing, they decided to see how far up the river they could go.

As Archie was the strongest skater he took the lead, and as they neared the bend near to Dobson's landing they did not notice the thinness of the ice, and before they were aware of their danger they were in the most treacherous part of the river, where the current is strong and the river had been open on Tuesday. The little fellow could not stop himself in time, and the ice broke and he fell in.

He called to his comrades to help him, but they were so terror-stricken that they could not move. The unfortunate boy struggled hard, but was so chilled by the cold water that his attempts to hold on to the ice proved useless. The last words that he was heard to utter were: "I'm almost froze. I'm lost." His companions watched him disappear for the third time, and as he did not rise again they hurried back to town, which was almost a mile from the scene, and notified their parents, and the alarm soon spread, officers and physicians soon arrived and a large crowd of men lined the river side, but the body was not found till next morning. When the news reached his parents they became almost frantic with grief. The little fellow was an active lad, and a pupil of Winthrop grammar school and of the Methodist Sunday school. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the family in their sorrow.

Buddhists are Protesting.

Yokohama, via Victoria, B. C., Jan. 13.—A strong protest is being made by an influential section of the Buddhists against the bill for the regulation of religions. The aim of the measure is the equality of all religions under the law. It gives the death blow to any hope of having Buddhism recognized as in any sense the state religion. The large majority of the Buddhist section, however, acquiesce in the new order of things.

The suppression of the plague has been successful. While it has by no means yet been stamped out, there has been an average of only about one case per day, and in Kobe and Osaka, where the infection is greatest, some days now pass without a case being reported.

The sentence of the American murderer Miller has been confirmed by the Japanese Court of Cassation, and his execution will take place in the latter part of January.
