ANNUAL FLOWERING PLANTS.

(Experimental Farms Note.) Annual flowering plants are of easy culture and not only add greatly to the exterior decorations, but are serviceable for indoor use.

A small hot-bed may be desirable to start the plants, or they may be started in a bright window and the plants transplanted into flats (shallow boxes with three inches of soil), about two inches apart, and these placed in a hot-bed with moderate temperature.

They may be started about the middle of April so that good plants are possible for setting out in the latter part of May or early in June, or as soon as danger from frost is past.

Any good garden soil is suitable. On sufficient water to keep the soil damp should be given. The majority of annuals do not require a high temperature for their early growth, and loss from the damping-off fungus will give little trouble in the temperature during the early development of the plants is not kept too high after the plants appear and an excess of water is not used.

The China Aster. This is one of the finest of all annuals, but unfortunately because of a disease of which little is known its culture is often a disappointment. This plant develops a shallow root system, and by shallow cultivation and sufficient water to prevent drying out of the soil and maintaining a moderate soil temperature satisfactory results are possible.

This, together with the handling of the plant, so that little of any check in growth results, will make possible the development of a good percentage of fine flowers.

Early asters seeding may be done in the open ground early in the spring, just as soon as the ground can be worked, and the plants thinned to ten or twelve inches apart.

Coreopsis. Of these Coreopsis (Calliopis) tinctoria and C. Drummondii are the best. They are of easy culture, doing well in most any soil.

Cosmos. Some of the early-flowering strains of this plant are particularly desirable, giving daisy-like flowers in white and pink shades.

Galliardia. This plant with its orange and crimson flowers is desirable, but it is not particular as to treatment.

Gypsophila. This graceful annual plant must be included because sprays with many tiny white flowers are needed for most effective decoration in the use of the other flowers that may be grown.

Marigolds. The Pot marigold (Calendula officinalis), the African Marigold (Tagetes erecta), the French Marigold (T. patula), and the Dwarf Marigold (T. signata pumila), the latter particularly suitable for borders, with their yellow and orange colorings are effective for decorative purposes.

They come along best at a higher temperature than most annuals require.

Larkspur. The annual larkspur will do best in a cool moist soil and its blue spikes of rich blue, white, and various shades of pink are very effective.

Salpiglossis. The dainty funnel-shaped flowers in various colours of yellow and brown make this a highly desirable cut flower. Very susceptible to damping-off when a seedling, to avoid which keep cool and do not force too rapidly.

Snaggon. Highly desirable and of easy culture; very hardy, and in various colours.

Scabiosa. Varies in colour from white through pink, red and blue to almost black, and should be included as one of the most satisfactory.

Stocks. These range in colour from white to purple, and are especially desirable for their delightful perfume emitted during the early evening.

Zinnia. One of our best flowers; should be included in any collection of annuals, in many colours.

Strawflower. (Helichrysum). Very desirable for winter decoration. When nicely open cut the long stems and hang up to dry in a cool place.
