WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 7.—The American freighter Manhattan Island arrived in New York from Constantinople recently with 67,898 pounds of Turkish tobacco, 17,247 boxes of figs and 6,465 parcels of Oriental rugs and other luxuries. The cargo netted more than \$2,000,000 in customs duty, believed to be a record for a single American ship.

Taylor McKim presided at the organ playing the wedding march of Mendelssohn and Wagner. The choir sang "The Voice That Breathed Our Eden." In the evening Rev. Mr. Haslam and Mrs. Haslam left for their future home in Petticoe, and were accompanied by many good wishes and valuable gifts. The wedding was informally conducted owing to the recent death of the father of the groom.

ENCOURAGE FARMERS TO SETTLE IN DRY-BELT EDMONTON, Dec. 7.—Reciprocal arrangements are now in effect between Alberta and Saskatchewan in connection with the movement of settlers from the dry belts. A similar plan to that already adopted in this province has been put into operation in Saskatchewan with the transportation costs divided in the same way between the provincial and federal governments and the railways, and the benefits of the scheme have been extended to apply to settlers moving from either province.

DARWIN'S EVOLUTION ATTACKED BY SWEDIST BOTANIST STOCKHOLM, Dec. 7.—A declaration that Darwin's theory of evolution is wrong comes from the Rev. Dr. J. Elander, a Swedish country minister more famous as a botanist, who has just returned to his congregation and an orchard of at least a thousand varieties of willows and willow hybrids, after a botanical tour through the United States and Canada. "The cross-breeding of plants is as fascinating to a botanist as the cross breeding of races to a biologist," says Dr. Elander. "Cross-breeds usually occur when the willows go northward, or to higher altitudes in mountainous countries. The female willow is a more hardy and aggressive pioneer than the male, but continues being fertilized by the male as long as he is able to follow. When the male plants find the migration too hard and gives up, the female willow accepts fertilization from some male of a kindred species and thus cross-breeds arise." Dr. Elander added that there were more than 70 varieties of willows, or willows, and many thousands of cross-breeds.

The United States customs officers prevented the Swedish botanist from taking in live botanical specimens which he wanted to show to American scientists. This was in accordance with the law designed to prevent spreading of plant diseases. Dr. Elander now intends to prevail upon the Swedish government to inspect plants which it is desired to export, and to give pledges to the United States authorities that they are free from diseases.

IN MEMORIAM

A MILLION DOLLAR LOSS NEWBURN, N.C. Dec. 7.—Approximately 1,200 persons most of them negroes, were made homeless, about 200 residences, two churches, two warehouses and several small stores were destroyed, and loss estimated at 1,000,000 was caused by fire which late yesterday swept twenty blocks in the western section of Newburn. The flames starting in the negro section gained great headway before a high wind at the start, because the local fire department was engaged at the opposite side of the town fighting a fire at the Roper Co's sawmill where \$300,000 damage was estimated to have been done.

SEIZE DAGGERS, PISTOLS NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Operating on reports of a threatened Tong war, Special Police Commissioner Simon and a dozen detectives to-day raided Hop Sing Tong headquarters in Chinatown arrested the president Lee Yee Hong, and confiscated 15 pistols, a box of daggers and brass knuckles, and thousands of rounds of ammunition.

Coué Coming To America To Teach Method Of Healing

French Exponent of Auto-Suggestion to Demonstrate Theory and Lecture

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—The following was issued last night by Oliver P. Lyford of 70 Fifth Avenue. "Announcement was made by Oliver S. Lyford, 70 Fifth Avenue, representing a group of New York men and women who are deeply interested in the work of M. Emile Coué of Nancy, France, the distinguished exponent of the practice of auto-suggestion, who has become an international figure through his achievements, will visit New York in January. M. Coué is scheduled to arrive on January 10, and will remain in this country about two weeks, making public appearance in this city and in Cleveland and Washington.

"The first public meeting which M. Coué will address will take place at Town Hall on the afternoon of Jan. 12. The next meeting scheduled is for the evening of Jan. 24, when M. Coué will be the guest of the French committee of the McDowell Club at 108 West Fifty fifth street. On the afternoon of January 26th, he will be the guest of the League for Political Education at Town Hall. Other meetings will be announced later. It is hoped that arrangements may be made for demonstrations of the method used by M. Coué for assisting in the cure of ailments through auto-suggestion."

Speaking of the plans for the welcoming of M. Coué, Mr. Lyford said: "Monsieur Emile Coué comes to this country at the invitation of many friends personally to explain his system of auto-suggestion. For years the sick and afflicted of France have been making pilgrimages to Nancy to wait patiently for the few words of help and guidance which have so often brought about their cure. We are happy to announce that America will now have a brief opportunity to see and hear him. The demands at home are so insistent that he can remain in America only two weeks, beginning about January 10.

"M. Coué is establishing a clinic at Paris, where he hopes that his work will be perpetuated, and the entire proceeds of his lectures in America will be devoted to the support of the clinic. He will take no personal remuneration beyond the expenses of his trip.

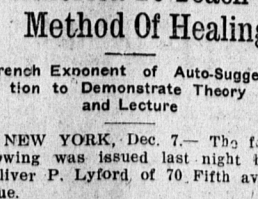
"It should be clearly understood that M. Coué is not a doctor. He simply teaches the method of auto-healing through conscious auto-suggestion and helps people to practice this method. It is expected that a number of groups of doctors will confer with M. Coué the attitude of these doctors being at present one of investigation.

"Such demonstrations as may be given will necessarily be limited to fifty persons or less, and there will be time for only very few gatherings of this character. Different groups of friends are arranging various meetings to welcome the distinguished guest."
