PLANS ACCEPTED.—At a meeting of the building committee of the First Baptist Church, Moncton, held Thursday evening, the plans of Mr. C. B. Chappell, Architect, of Charlottetown, P. E. Island, were received and it was decided to call for tenders, to be closed by August 12th. There was a large attendance of committee members, and much interest manifested in the work. It was decided that the cost of construction should not exceed \$60,000. On motion of Dr. H. H. Coleman it was decided to receive the plans of Architect Chappell, call for tenders, for stock brick, pressed brick and stone, the lowest or any tender not necessarily accepted; tenders to be closed August 12th.
