Canadian Good Roads Association

MONTREAL, Aug. 23.—The tentative programme for the nineteenth annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association, newly from the press, provides for seven sessions, five being devoted to business and two to recreation, covering the three days set for the gathering, September 12th to 14th, inclusive. Following its policy of emphasizing the Dominion wide scope of the organization, the association has not only held conventions in every province of Canada, but has endeavored to alternate between the eastern, central and western portions of the country, but circumstances having made it inadvisable to accept any of the invitations extended by the western provinces for the convention this year, Digby, N. S., was selected as being a convenient rallying point for the Maritime Provinces, and also as easily accessible to many members in Ontario and Quebec. The Pines Hotel, chosen as convention headquarters has been reserved in its entirety for the accommodation of the delegates, and will lend itself admirably to the purposes of a gathering devoted largely to serious business and avoiding by preference the distractions of a larger centre. The programme as issued covers a wide range of lectures, addresses and discussions connected with the problems of road building, maintenance and finance, safety on the highways, tourist travel promotion, and related subjects, which will be dealt with by recognized authorities of national and international reputation, and with the additions to be made before the convention opens, it promises to be perhaps the most interesting and important in the history of the organization since its first annual gathering in 1914. Applications for reservations are already being received in encouraging numbers, and a large attendance is indicated.
