This will be the only area in Prince Edward Island to undergo such a survey this summer.

Charges Laid in Bergmann Case

Two charges under the new Temperance Act were laid before Magistrate R. S. Hinton, K.C., in Summerside yesterday, one against Walter Bergmann, of Travellers Rest, and one against his tenant farmer, Joseph Martin. The trials will probably commence next week. Mr. Bergmann is in Toronto but it is understood that he will return as soon as he is advised that the charges have been laid.

The charges arose out of a search that took place at the Bergmann summer home and at the home of Mr. Martin last Monday by members of Summerside detachment R. C. M. P. It is alleged that they "unlawfully had in their possession liquor which has not been purchased from a vendor under the provisions of the P. E. I. Temperance Act."

These cases have aroused public interest due to the fact that the day following the seizure Mr. Bergmann had Sgt. D. J. Heath and Sgt. Leo Lauman arrested and action taken against them for \$10,000 damages for trespassing on his property. The officers were released when they put up bail for the amount of the suit. This civil case will be heard in the Supreme Court, probably in the fall.
