sentiment was awakened and laws were passed protecting the birds. Their numbers are now increasing, but slowly, for the beaches and low islands which the terns nest "are often swept by storm tides that destroy both eggs and young."

NOTES FROM POWNAL

A letter has just come in from Miss Maude M. Jones of Pownal, who, it will be remembered, was one of the contributors to a series of bird-life published a few years ago. The note runs: "Dear Agricola, We were greatly pleased that the Legislature accepted your choice of the Lady's Slipper for our Floral Emblem. There are a few growing in our vicinity. Last summer a lady brought me a bouquet of beautiful flowers. In it were three stems with green foliage and two blossoms of which I say also glorified Lady's Slipper on each stem. They were larger than our common ones. The pouch was mainly pink and had white wings, or petals, so that it looked like a bird or beautiful moth, hovering above the flowers. They were exquisitely beautiful and we wished that you could have seen them. We are glad with much interest to see your Notes in the 'Guardian'."

In the summer of 1938 I sent you a description of a bird that I could not identify. Since then I have read in your Notes a description of a Wilson's Warbler that was identical with the one I described, and I have seen one every summer since, with the exception of last year. We have had two Robins around all winter, also a Junco, Robins and Song Sparrows are arriving and other birds will soon follow."

I was very glad to hear from Miss Jones, who was formerly a valued contributor to this column. The Wilson's Warbler, I find from my records, was described in 1944, from an actual specimen, rescued from the cat with much interest of the Lady's Slipper is delightful and fixes the species as the true Cupripedium hirsutum (or spectabile as some call it.) For lack of space I must hold over other remarks till next week.

valive and bid only five spades. When this got around to North, the latter felt, with reason, that this own opening bid had been too light for him now to take further action.

South should have deferred the cue bid until he had more information about the fit of the North and South hands. A mere two-spade overall of the two clubs was all that was necessary on the first round. Then, whether or not West put in his shutout raise, South could later try his cue bid. Even if he had to bid six clubs over West's raise of five clubs, that course would be reasonable if by so doing South was making an obvious demand on North for a choice between spades and diamonds at the six-level.

If South felt, for any reason, that a mere two-spade call on the first round would not be satisfactory, he could have jumped to three spades. The crucial point was that
