Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made through the Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

1. Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

2. In districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

3. Utilities—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also six acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

4. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duration—Six months residence in each of three years. Must reside six months in each of three years. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Mayor Brown said that he would like to see the caravel visited by all the school children and the teachers. There could be no better object lesson for the scholars than this craft, showing what Columbus had accomplished. The world owes Columbus a debt of gratitude not alone because of his wonderful opposition and difficulties but for that great strength of character which was his, shown by his perseverance and unswerving faith. His Worship concluded by expressing the hope that the teachers and children would visit the ship and combine with it the reading of the life of Christopher Columbus, and from it they would derive a great deal of benefit. His Worship then declared the ship open for inspection.

Handsome pennants bearing the arms of Queen Isabella and King Ferdinand of Spain and historic postal cards showing scenes from the life of Columbus are for sale on the ship for those who desire these interesting souvenirs.

**Letter From
Member Of Fifth
Siege Battery**

Mrs. John McDonald, Murray River, as received the following interesting letter from her son in No. 5 Siege Battery, at present in England:
Whitley Camp,
Surrey, Eng.
Oct. 8, 1916.

Dear mother:
Just a few lines so let you know some things about our trip across We left Halifax the next morning after we left Charlottetown. We stayed in the Basin for twentyfour hours before sailing, and left on Wednesday morning at 6.30. We were on the water from that time till Thursday morning, when we sighted Ireland, so we had to take the north of Ireland coasts for safety. Shortly after we saw the coast there were six destroyers accompanied us from there. A cruiser came all the way with us. There were five transports came over together. I could not think to write about our trip, but hope to get back some time and tell you about it; it sure will be interesting. Our letters have to be censored before going to Canada, and I am writing this letter at the Y.M.C.A. If you write or send me anything address as follows:
Army Post Office, London, Eng., No. 5 Siege Battery,
1261427, C. E. F.

This is only a resting camp, so we have a good time here. There was a German zeppelin brought down here eight miles from where we camp. I thought I could get a piece of it to send you for a souvenir, but I'll send your lots of souvenirs, if you go back. I hope you get along all right till I get back. You don't need to be ashamed of the step I have taken. If you were here you would be proud to have a son to go. If I live to see you again, which I trust God will spare me, it will be well worth yours and my own sacrifice. So I will stop writing, as there are so many things to write about. I am going to keep a diary, so you can read some when I get back. I must close with love in you and father, and all the family. In God we trust. Good-bye.

**The Hyphenate vote
May Decide Election**

A year ago, or even six months ago, it was commonly said by those who have studied American politics that the Presidential candidate who got the German-American vote would be defeated, the idea being that the bulk of the people would vote against the man who appealed to the hyphenated. This opinion must be revised. While the hyphen is an issue in the election, that will be held next week, it is not an issue between parties. Both candidates have publicly repudiated the hyphenated. Both parties have tried to get the German-American vote. It is possible that this vote will go solidly or nearly so to one candidate or the other, and that it will be so secretly done that the other candidate will not be able to get all the non-German-American vote to replace it. The German-American vote in itself is not large enough to elect a President, though it can in some states elect members of the electoral college, or, in other words, control it can, in many instances, command sufficient influence to change the result from Democratic to Republican. In other words, it may hold a balance of power.

But One Faithful.

A consideration of the strength of the foreign-born American vote is made for the New York Times by Prof. Frank Bohn, a Teuton, who is nevertheless an American, and also a Democrat. Allowance being made for his political leanings, his remarks may well be carefully weighed by those who are calculating upon the German-American influence in the American Republic. He says that every German-American vote be used en bloc in the interest of the Kaiser's Government. Of weekly newspapers and other periodicals the number which oppose this


