PRESIDENT DIAZ PROMISES MANY REFORMS IN MEXICO

ered capable of voting," were advocated.

The message refers specifically to the application of the no-re-election principle, to the naming of governors, one of the chief contentions of the discontented element throughout the republic, the president stating if a bill providing for the "periodical renovation" of the officials in question should come before congress it would have his earnest support.

Abuse of power by Jefes politico, another of the evils complained of by residents in the rural districts, is to be abated, according to the plan outlined by the president.

The president proposes to improve the efficiency of the judiciary through a more careful selection of its personal and lengthening of its tenure of office. Efficacious punishment of judicial functionaries for malfeasance is to be brought about through the enactment of more stringent measures.

On the subject of the division of the great private estates, first broached by Minister Limantour in his Paris interview, the executive declared his determination to find efficient means for bringing about the innovation.

In no previous message of the president's has there been anything in the nature of recommendation. Until today his messages have been summaries of things accomplished. The public, knowing that the president would in this message to the twenty-fifth congress, depart from the ordinary and suggest special legislation, has shown the most intense interest.

This feeling of expectancy found expression in the members of congress and from the minute the chief executive entered the chamber of deputies until the last word of his message every man on the floor as well as those persons in the galleries, listened intently. Every available seat in the galleries was occupied either by diplomats, public officials, or by those fortunate enough to have obtained cards of admission.

President Diaz appeared no more aged tonight than he did when he read his message in September, and in spite of the fact that the reading today required more than an hour, his voice was as strong at the conclusion as at the beginning.

Only once was the president interrupted by applause. At the mention of reforms there was a spontaneous clapping of hands for one brief moment, and then there was heard no more applause until the close, when the big auditorium resounded to hand clapping and cries of "Viva!"

The audience followed the leader keenly. Now and then some one would cough or a shuffling of feet would be heard and instantly scores of frowning faces were turned toward the origin of the sound and low choruses of hisses, the signal of silence, would arise.

EL PASO, Tex., April 1—Gloom hangs tonight over those circles where despatches of the last week aroused hopes for an early peace in Mexico. Cause, therefore, is found in the insurrecto activities which continue throughout the disturbed regions and along the border, according to private and news despatches received here today.

These include continued destruction of railroad property between Durango and Torreon, the sacking of Mez-

quite Del Oro mining camp in Zacatecas and the invasion of Jalisco by a band under Louis Moya.

Advises state that the insurrectos have established a chain of guards from Columbus to Casas Grandes and as they control the custom house at Volcanes, opposite Columbus, they were receiving arms and ammunition direct from shippers.

There has been no further fighting in Sonora as far as known in Hermosillo. Despatches from that city today tell only of the bringing of wounded federals from San Rafael, there being sixty-six wounded now in the capital. Many have died on the field as no physician was with the federal troops. Indians fought on both sides, the Pimas with the insurrectos and the Yaquis with the federals.

B. W. and K. S. Langley of Winnipeg, Canada, who were arrested last night in Juarez, were released today. Both signed statements that they had set out to join the insurrectos, but were turning back to the United States when arrested.
