REFERENCE TO SUPREME COURT.

Months ago and from time to time since The Guardian advocated the reference to the higher courts of our claims in regard to representation. We apprehended and so stated that neither the Government nor Parliament at Ottawa would do us justice, and this has now been found to be the case. We believed that the Island had a much stronger case for judicial than for legislative appeal; that our constitutional claim, if not absolutely a sure one was at least good on its face and ought to be determined by a high authority authorized to interpret the laws which regulate the relations between the Provinces and the central authority of the Dominion. Such power has been specially given to the Supreme Court of Canada in the amendment introduced in 1891 by Sir John Thompson to 33 Vic. Cap. 2.

This amendment which is now law provides for the reference to the Supreme Court of important questions of law, or fact touching provincial legislation, or touching the constitutionality of any legislation of the Parliament of Canada, and the Court shall hear and consider the same, and shall certify to the Governor in Council its opinion on

questions so referred, with the reasons therefor, which shall be given in like manner as in the case of a judgment upon an appeal; the Court, and any Judge who differs from the opinion of the majority shall in like manner certify his opinions and his reasons. . . . If for any reason the Government of any Province has any special interest in any such question, the Attorney General of such Province shall be notified of the hearing in order that he may be heard if he thinks fit. Such is the substance of the legal provisions in regard to our right to be heard in reference to this question of representation.

We naturally commend the Government and the Opposition alike in pursuing a course in regard to this matter which had been before advised in these columns. But beyond and apart from that consideration it is now quite clear that a reference to the higher courts is the only means by which we can obtain or hope to obtain justice. This is, in fact, our last and only resort in the present emergency. Unless the courts are appealed to we shall be from time to time desuded and deprived of a portion of our representation, as we have been already, until we may be left with but a single representative in the House of Commons. It is also of the utmost consequence that our Province should be fully and ably represented at the hearing before the Supreme Court when it shall take place.
